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LEGISLATURE IN MUDDLE OVER TAXATION MEASURES

(Continued from first page.)
during the interim, paved the way for the tax reduction and tax distribution program for which the present administration will claim and get most of the credit.
Representative Shelton, predicted today that number 141, which would centralize the power of fixing assessments in the state tax commission and which failed last night, will not be enacted by this session. The members of the ways and means committee and several others were absent at the time it failed to pass. The house adjourned at 5:30 without having passed a bill during the entire day, except some of the taxation measures left over from the

special order of the day before.
Number 144, to provide for the exemption of growing timber upon deforested lands, and number 186, making amendments to the law governing the operations of the tax conservation and supervising commission, were enacted at the afternoon session. Number 146, to transfer to the irrevocable schools fund receipts from inheritance tax was voted down for the reason that taking this money from the general fund would make necessary a larger direct millage.

Senator Johnson's resolution calling for a ten per cent reduction in salaries was voted down in the house. It was said that it reached only the man getting the small salary. The house adopted an unfavorable committee report upon senate bill 99, requiring two farmers upon the game commission. The bill was characterized as an attempt to wreck the game commission because of a joker in it. The governor now has the power to appoint as many farmers as he sees fit. Shelton's railroad rate bill went the same route.

House point resolution to submit an amendment extending the benefits of the bonus act to service men who were in the regular forces but deprived of the benefits because of arbitrary date after which enlistments must have been made in order to benefit under the act, was acted upon favorably, as was the senate joint memorial to ask congress to designate Harrisburg as the head of navigation of the Willamette. At present Eugene is so designated, which makes it necessary for draws to be maintained in the two railway bridges at Harrisburg and would also make a draw necessary in any bridge which Lane and Linn counties may build.

House concurrent resolution number 6, to permit Portland to finance a fair in 1927, received quick favorable action.
A house bill is in to raise the motor speed limit to 35 miles and to provide that after five years any car shall pay only the minimum license fee of \$15. A new revenue measure would lay a tax on movie films.

The ways and means committee has voted to give governor Pierce the full amount of \$450,000 which he asked to be expended in putting the state penitentiary upon a paying basis.
Thirty bills are on the calendar in the house for tomorrow, which is as large a day's work as might be expected when it is considered how little was done today. The house is reported as well in advance of the senate, where consolidation has completely glutted the wheels.

The first fish fight of the session, probably will be precipitated when the bill to close the Willamette below the bridge at Oregon City comes on for final passage tomorrow.
