This mixture to be pasteurized and then homogenized before freezing. This will produce an ice cream of very smooth texture, a rich, creamy flavor and of very light color. We add no artificial color. As is well known, whipped cream is almost snow white. Ice cream is merely whipped cream frozen. Ask for
