BENEFITS FOR DISABLED VETS ARE INCREASED

Many Ex-Service Men Affected by Passage of New Relief Measure for Soldiers.

Seattle, Wash., April 9.—Numerous benefits, until now unavailable to disabled ex-service men, and granted through the passage of a new veteran relief measure, will be put into effect in this district immediately. L. C. Jessep, Pacific northwest manager of the United States veterans' bureau, announced today. Many war veterans will be affected, he stated.

The benefits follow: Every world war veteran who was discharged prior to the establishment of the veterans' bureau on August 9, 1921, shall be conclusively held to have been in sound condition when entering the service, except as to such disabilities as were noted of record when or prior to the time he entered the service.

An ex-service man who is shown by examination of a veterans' bureau medical officer or other qualified physician to have a mental disease or a active tubercular disease of 10 per cent or more, within three years (formerly two years) after separating from the service, shall be considered to have acquired his disability in such service or to have suffered an aggravation of pre-existent tubercular and mental disability.

A certificate of disability may be obtained prior to March 4, 1924, which, except in case of fraud, shall be incontestable evidence that injury for which it is issued was suffered in or aggravated by the military service.

Where a veteran of any war dies after his discharge from the service and does not leave sufficient assets to meet the expense of burial and transportation of his body, the veterans' bureau will pay for a flag to drape the casket and also for burial expense will pay a sum not exceeding \$100. If death occurs while such person is receiving governmental medical, surgical or hospital treatment or vocational training, the bureau shall pay in addition to burial expenses, actual and necessary cost of transportation of the body, including the preparation of the body, to a place of burial within the continental limits of the United States.

Payments of premiums on yearly renewable term insurance and converted insurance may be deemed to not have lapsed in the cases of those persons who, while mentally incompetent and for whom no legal guardian had been appointed, have heretofore allowed or may hereafter allow their insurance to lapse while so suffering, during the period for which they have been or may hereafter be so rated.

HAND AND GUSTAVO TO MEET AGAIN THIS MONTH

Ralph Hand, local middleweight wrestling favorite, and Ad Gustavo will wrestle in Cottage Grove the latter part of this month. The date has not yet been definitely fixed. The men have agreed to wrestle at 165 pounds ringside.

Hand and Gustavo have wrestled two matches, one at Gold Hill, where Hand got one fall in two hours and 15 minutes, and one here, where Gustavo got two falls and Hand one. Gustavo is sure that he can defeat Hand but Hand and his friends think otherwise and the bout will attract the attention of wrestling fans of the entire state.

SMALL STREAMS ARE CLOSED FOR FISHING

Frank Brass creek, Laying creek, Rat creek, Wilson creek and Cedar creek, tributaries of Row river and Coast fork, have been closed indefinitely for fishing by the state game commission for the protection of the fishing in the larger streams, such as Sharp's creek, Mosby creek, Coast fork and Row river. The order will probably remain in force for two or three years, according to members of the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club, who are very much interested in the action.

LEGION AUXILIARY WILL MAKE HOSPITAL GARMENTS

The auxiliary of the American Legion voted at its Monday night meeting to take up the work of making hospital garments for the veterans' hospital in Portland. The hospitalization committee of the American Legion is at the head of the project. All of those eligible to membership in the auxiliary are urged to attend the meetings, which are being held on the second and fourth Mondays of each month in I. O. O. F. hall.

Wholesale Price of Gasoline Drops

SPECIAL ROAD LEVIES INVALID THINKS ATTORNEY

Irregularities Existed in Most Districts in Which Taxpayers Voted Improvements.

That each of the 43 special road levies in Lane county for 1922 is invalid and illegal is the opinion of District Attorney Johnston, given at the request of County Judge Barnard a few days ago following the action of the county court in canceling the special road levy made in district 33, at Walton, after suit had been instituted by the Siuslaw Timber company to declare the levy void because of the alleged failure of citizens of the district to comply with the law in making the levy.

Alleged irregularities in the election in district 33 are said by Mr. Johnston to have been the same as in most of the other districts in which road levies were voted.

Should the court declare illegal the levy in each of the 43 districts, as has been done in district 33, thousands of dollars in taxes for road improvement in 1923 will be lost by the districts. Just what effect such action would have is not stated. A large majority of taxpayers have paid the first half of their taxes, including the special road tax levied, and if the levies are declared illegal the possibility of many complications is seen.

Among the districts involved are No. 17, Wildwood; 19, Oakridge; 56, Fawn Creek; 64, Cartwright School House; 69, Silk Creek; 76, Mosby Creek.

London Pokes Fun at Yankees.

Not long ago a couple of English frequenters of the restaurant arrived at a state of mind wherein the production of the following rhyme was achieved: Four-and-twenty Yankees, Feeling mighty dry, Took a train to Canada And bought a case of rye. When the case was opened The Yanks began to sing: "To blazes with the president! 'God save the king!'" The parody is going the rounds of London's clubs to the accompaniment of much laughter and feeble grins from Americans.

FARM POINTERS

(From O. A. C. Experiment Station) Early gardens are subject to severe injury by slimy, slow-moving, repulsive slugs. The plants may be protected with a repellent spray of bordeaux mixture. For the home garden probably the commercial bordeaux mixture diluted as recommended on the container will give good results. In addition prepare a poison bait of calcium-arsenate used at the rate of one ounce to one pound of chopped lettuce leaves. Mix these thoroughly and place in small heaps near the plants and frames to be protected. Kale, elover or other succulent leaves may be substituted for the lettuce.

Disease organisms are apt to be found on ground where old poultry stock has been recently run. It is desirable to rear chicks on ground which has not held stock for some time.

Chicks of different ages seldom or never grow to advantage for either group if run together.

Fruit worms and bud moths are becoming active on the opening cluster buds of apples and pears. Where they appear in sufficient numbers to attract attention, add lead-arsenate to the regular delayed dormant or to the pink spray at the rate of two pounds to 100 gallons of the solution.
