

ABERDEEN COUPLE HURT WHEN CROWDED OFF ROAD

Car Driven by Aged Woman Forced into Ditch and Wrecked; No Assistance Proffered.

Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Johnson, an aged couple whose home is in Aberdeen, Wash., were under the care of a physician here for several days of the past week as a result of an automobile accident which happened a mile or two north of Creswell shortly after 7 o'clock Saturday evening.

The Johnson car, a Chevrolet sedan, traveling south, was forced off the grade, according to Mr. and Mrs. Johnson, by another car which passed going in the same direction. The Johnson car was seriously damaged.

Mr. Johnson described the car as a Maxwell sport roadster with black or blue body and red disk wheels. Two men were in the car. EVERYDAY INCIDENTS ARE PROOF OF NECESSITY FOR SERVICES OF SPEED COP

While conditions have greatly improved since word has been fairly well circulated to the effect that careless and reckless driving in Cottage Grove will not be permitted, incidents happen nearly every day which show the need of a traffic officer and the natural question is "To what extremes would motorists go if there were no traffic officers?"

A carload of young hoodlums from Eugene came to Cottage Grove Saturday night to show off on the streets here in a manner which they did not dare try in Eugene. They drove up and down Main street discharging firecrackers and acting in a boisterous manner. The traffic officer stopped them and demanded to see the drivers' license of the operator of the car, who gave his name as P. C. Miller. He had none and the officer demanded cash bail of \$5 for appearance in police court Monday forenoon.

METERS ORDERED TO REGULATE USE OF CITY WATER

Council Establishes \$1.90 as Monthly Minimum for Water Service Outside of City.

Excessive use of city water, principally for irrigation purposes, will be regulated by the use of meters, which the city council has ordered installed for all heavy users of water.

An application for water connection for irrigation purposes was granted to J. T. Utz, who lives just outside the city limits on east Main street, and a meter was ordered.

The council fixed the minimum monthly charge for water users outside the city at \$1.90. Lincoln Taylor, who some years ago staked maps and charts of the grade caused the right front wheel to give way and it is possible that the rear left wheel gave way when the weight of the car was thrown onto it as it went into the ditch.
