COTTAGE GROVE IS SAFE FROM EARWIG UNTIL NEXT YEAR

Pest Found in Eugene Just at End of Dangerous Season; Three Districts Infested.

Cottage Grove is safe from the earwig pest until next year at least, according to C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector. After the middle of the present week danger of the earwig was past since the bugs have taken to the trees and will not travel any more this season.

The pests were found in three districts in Eugene last week and immediate action was taken by the city council to provide funds for eradication. The bugs found in Eugene were in houses and the residence districts rather than in orchard localities. In some places they had done considerable damage.

The progress of the earwig through the northwest has not been rapid. For two years the pest bothered Seattle and Portland. This year it traveled as far south as Eugene, reaching that city just at the end of the season when the earwig is dangerous.

Kime Sedan Damaged. The A. W. Kime sedan sustained a smashed running board and a dent in one door yesterday about noon when it was rammed by a car driven by a man named Kahler, who was following the Kime car east on Main and misinterpreted Mr. Kime's signal for a turn at Seventh.

Infectious abortion of cattle, wide spread in Oregon, has no diagnostic symptoms, but can be diagnosed by blood test. Infected animals often give birth to live, vigorous calves and may be very active spreaders of the disease. Owners of abortion-free herds are advised never to introduce females that have not been tested into their herds.
