THE KING OF STORES

One department store in Chicago occupies an exclusive building having a floor area of about forty-four acres. The space occupied by this building extends from forty-three feet below the street level to more than two hundred feet above the surface of the surrounding streets.

America holds many astounding examples of business enterprise, but this store is an enviable illustration of the great and valuable institutions that can be built up by concentrated and continuous painstaking effort to anticipate requirements and approximate perfection.

Accompanying a guide through this establishment you will hear a spiel something like this: "The main aisle of this store is three-hundred and eighty-five feet long. In normal times more than 9,000 men, women, boys and girls are required to perform the service of maintaining the operation of this great retail establishment. During special sale periods and the holiday season as many as 12,500 names have been on the payroll at one time. About 300 motor trucks and delivery vehicles are in daily operation hauling new stocks of goods from the railway stations, steamship docks and warehouses and delivering the purchases to the myriads of customers in the nearby territory. One of the largest switchboards ever constructed for a single institution is employed to transact the telephone business of this store with its customers. The average number of calls handled per day is in the neighborhood of 30,000. In extra busy times the number of calls has exceeded 50,000 in a single day.

"The basement floor contains more than 170,000 square feet of space and is the largest single-floor store on earth. For the purpose of speeding up the movement of patrons, employees, packages and freight within this store 92 elevators are in service. These elevators carry an average of about 25,000 passengers an hour and run 1,000 miles a day—or the distance from Chicago to New York. The entire seventh floor is divided into large rooms devoted to restaurant purposes; 8,000 persons can be served at one time, making this the largest known dining room. A separate dining room is operated for the officers and employees. All told about two-hundred and fifty cooks and helpers and 500 waitresses are required to handle the throngs which eat here daily. To light, heat, ventilate and operate this enormous store building, power sufficient to furnish light for a city of 100,000 inhabitants is required. (©, 1923, Western Newspaper Union.)

THE JUMEL MANSION

The Robert Morris house, more recently called the Jumel Mansion, located near One Hundred and Sixtieth street and Amsterdam avenue, in the city of New York. Is one of the most famous of all the historic buildings in that greatest of all American cities. Well preserved, it is a splendid specimen of Georgian architecture.

As history goes, Colonel Robert Morris of the Forty-seventh British regiment and a comrade-in-arms of General George Washington, purchased the property and erected this mansion which he subsequently presented to his bride, in 1768.

General Washington occupied the place in 1776, while 8,000 volunteer soldiers camped in the neighborhood. During a battle which resulted in the capture of Fort Washington, this house was the center of operations. In 1777 it served as the headquarters of the British army. In 1778 it was occupied by General Baron Von Kuypausen and his German following as Hessian headquarters.

Following the close of the Revolutionary war, this building was familiarly known as Calumet Inn. Stage coaches operating between New York city and Albany changed horses at this point. President Washington and his cabinet dined here in 1790.

In 1810 Stephen Jumel, a French wine merchant of fame and fortune, purchased this mansion, restored it to its condition in the time of Washington. Jumel died in 1832. The following year Mme. Jumel married the illustrious Aaron Burr who, in 1801, was elected vice president of the United States, and who shot and killed the celebrated Alexander Hamilton in a duel which was the outgrowth of a political feud, at Weehawken, New Jersey, in 1804. Subsequently, Attorney Chase, who studied law in Burr's office and who married a niece of Mme. Jumel, occupied this house for 50 years.

In 1903 the property was purchased by the city and in 1907 the Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution acquired the use of the house for a museum of historical relics and furnishings of the Revolutionary period.

In the council chamber, a large octagonal room at the rear of the broad hall, General Washington, it is said, received visits from the sachems of the five Iroquois tribes who came to offer their allegiance to the cause of liberty. (©, 1923, Western Newspaper Union.)
