CALIFORNIAN TURNS TABLES ON OREGON MOTORISTS

Resident of Sister State Says We Are Not Only Reckless But Also Heartless.

It is evident that Oregon has been wronging Californians in the many things which have been said about the recklessness of motorists from our southern sister state.

E. S. Jackson, of Oakland, Calif., wishes to have his say about drivers of Oregon cars and expressed to The Sentinel a willingness to express his opinions. He and Mrs. Jackson have been camped in this vicinity for several weeks while Mr. Jackson has been employed at one of the mills.

One night last week, while they were coming home from Eugene, they met a big car on one of the curves between here and Saginaw. The car, bearing an Oregon license plate, gave no heed to Mr. Jackson's signals for dim lights and the result was Mr. Jackson's Ford went into the ditch and sustained a broken spring and broken wishbone.

Mr. Jackson stated that the driver, whose bright lights caused him to go into the ditch, did not stop and that 15 other cars, all bearing Oregon license plates, passed by without stopping to offer aid. A good Samaritan did arrive, however, in a car bearing a California license plate and Mr. and Mrs. Jackson were brought to the city. A service car was sent out from one of the garages of the city the next forenoon to bring in the wreck.

Mr. Jackson stated that a spotlight improperly focused on the big car which sent him into the ditch blinded him so that he could not see the road. He said that in his own state no spotlights are permitted unless locked so that they cast their rays not more than 10 feet ahead of the car and that the headlights must be focused to strike the road not more than 20 feet ahead of the car.

Mr. Jackson also had a few things to say about the carelessness of Oregon drivers. He believes that Oregon motorists are more reckless than those of his state because there are fewer traffic officers here.

He stated that California is drastically enforcing traffic laws and has a traffic officer to every five to ten miles of main highway.
