No one will presume to deny, we think, that there is abroad in this country a general impression that if we could only go back to the "good old days" before the war everything would be lovely and the goose would hang high. The cost of living was low then—everyone knows that. One could live on almost nothing, as compared to these frightful times. Anybody, if asked for an opinion, will declare positively that back in those halcyon days it was easy to get ahead, because one didn't have to give up all he got to the wicked and brutal profiteers.

But wait a minute. The other day the president of the savings bank division of the American Bankers' association gave out the significant statement that 25,000,000 citizens of this country, or roughly one-fourth of the entire population, now have savings accounts in national banks, state banks, trust companies and mutual savings banks. In 1912, the earliest year for which approximately comparable data can be obtained, there was only about half as much money in savings accounts as in 1922. Statistics on the number of savers in 1912 are lacking, but it is probable that if the amount of money saved has doubled there has been also a considerable increase in the number of savers.

It is safe enough to estimate that the average family includes about four persons. If that is true, there is now in this country an average of one savings account for each family. In these accounts there is twice as much money as in the good old days of 1912. When one gets down into the figures and studies them a little, it becomes apparent that the world isn't going to the dogs as fast as we are sometimes led to believe.

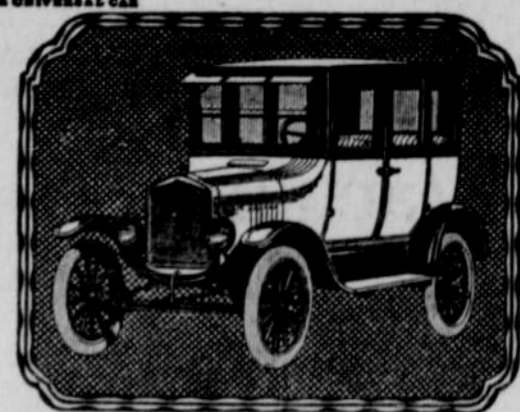
