LIME OF FALLING TREE PIERCES CITY WATER LINE

Cottage Grove was greatly inconvenienced from Tuesday noon until late Wednesday afternoon by an accident to the cast pipe line. A tree fell over the pipe line two or three miles out of the city and a limb of the tree pierced the pipe, passed through it and imbedded itself two feet deep under the pipe. The west side system proved inadequate for the demands, despite the fact that there was a reserve of 385,000 gallons when the west side reservoir was turned in. The Western Lumber & Export company had to cease operations at its mill because of lack of water for its boilers and Wednesday afternoon the schools closed because of lack of sufficient water for the heating plant. The work of repairing the line was completed at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon but it was two hours later that the water from the Rujada watershed was again reaching the city.
