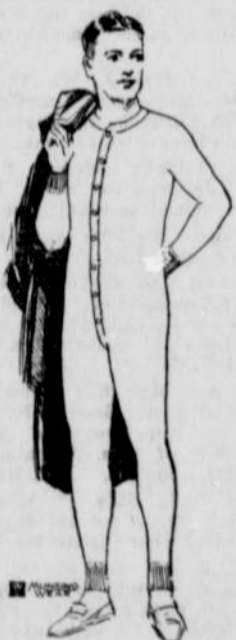

CHEMICAL SOCIETY OFFERS MANY PRIZES FOR ESSAYS

J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of education, has been officially notified of the opening of the prize essay contest of the American chemical society in which all students of high and secondary schools in the state of Oregon have been

invited to compete in a national contest for \$10,000 in cash prizes and scholarships to Yale, Vassar and other universities and colleges.

The contest, which is the result of the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Francis P. Garvan, of New York, is a memorial to their daughter Patricia and is intended to stimulate interest among high school students in the development of chemical science in this country.

Six prizes of \$20 in gold are to be awarded in each state in the union and scholarships to Yale and Vassar will be given for the six best essays in the United States.

These scholarships will carry with them tuition for four years in

chemistry or chemical engineering and \$500 a year in cash. In addition to these awards many other scholarships will be offered through various universities and colleges.

The contest is fully described in a pamphlet which will be distributed through the high schools.
