GUSHER IS REPORTED FROM THE HALF MOON BAY FIELD

(Concluded from first page)
It was at the 3200-foot level that oil in commercial quantity was found. Upon learning of its success the association filled the well with water to hold in the oil pending the building of adequate storage facilities.

It is reported that no more work will be done on the well, such as the completion of the capping, until storage tanks have been constructed. Another report was that the association contemplated the building of an oil line to tidewater at Half Moon bay.

While the La Honda field has been proven oil ground for 50 years, the success of the association has given a spurt to drilling on adjoining ranches. The principal attraction of the field up to the present was the fine grade of oil. Drilling on the adjoining Sage & Olson leases has been going on for many years, but oil has never been found in such quantity as to make the operations more than self-supporting.

Portland papers have carried short news dispatches telling of the striking of the gusher referred to in the stories from the San Francisco paper.

Dr. David E. Olson, moving spirit of the Guaranty Oil company which is operating here, also one of the owners of the Sage & Olson Brothers leases referred to in the news stories reprinted above and also one of the parties to the somewhat famous Woodard-Olson controversy over the value of the Sage-Olson holdings at Half Moon bay, is enthusiastic over the report of the gusher. He has been taking considerable pleasure in saying "I told you so." He states emphatically that within a year he will be able to say the same for the Cottage Grove district.
