Shall we abandon the good old-fashioned American way of getting ahead by honest work and good, by thrift and intelligence?

ARTICLE TEN

WHAT IS AMERICA?

Prophecy usually is an unprofitable exercise. This fact is probably what first suggested the wholesome American aphorism "never prophesy unless you know." When, therefore, we attempt to discuss Life Insurance in its relation to the future of America it is with no wish or intention to plunge into the uncalculated imagination or to sail away upon some beautiful cloud of desire. In such a discussion, there is plenty of solid ground upon which to stand.

What is America? So many square miles of land and water; so much material resource developed and undeveloped; so many political and social institutions; so many millions of people? Yes, but these do not in themselves make a nation. A nation is its soul. Nothing else is the nation. America is a beautiful soul and an American is a man whose soul loves the soul of America no matter what may be his racial ancestry or his social status.

The soul of America expresses itself in a great idea, or ideal, which we call "The will to be free." Under the light of this noble ideal the individual is clothed with dignity and is invested with sacred rights. Along with these rights go equally sacred duties; for no right can long be enjoyed without full acceptance of the responsibilities which are a part of it.

The first right of an American citizen is the right to create and maintain his own government. This right is supported by the fundamental duties of citizenship. When we over-emphasize our political right and neglect our political duties things always go wrong. We then substitute politics for statesmanship, self-interest for the common good, and give the demagogue his chance to take the helm.

Self-support is another primary right and duty of the American citizen. A man who will not or cannot support himself sooner or later has to abandon the right to govern himself. Whoever supports him becomes his master whether it be the State or some individual or institution.

Now, this self-governing and self-supporting citizen is only one of a hundred million. His most urgent need, therefore, is to learn the art of free cooperation with his fellows, not only in government but in economics, religion, education, art, science and all the social institutions that go to make up civilization. For, indeed, civilization itself is simply the successful practice of cooperation among people of different capacities.

Individual initiative, individual effort, individual reward, all achieved in friendly and free cooperation with others of like mind, this is Americanism. Our government is for the purpose of protecting the citizen in his rights, which are life, liberty and pursuit of happiness. Beyond this, for the American, the least government is the best government.

Under this system and by the practice of these ideals America has come to her present great position. There are still injustices to be overthrown, inequalities to be rectified, mistakes and failures to be corrected, but here in America we have reached the highest level of comfort and the widest distribution of wealth ever achieved by any society. We give to our youth a better equipment for life and a wider opportunity for the realization of its powers than has been given by any other State in history.

One might expect that under these conditions America would keep right on being American; solving its problems on American principles and by American methods, keeping all that is good and progressing steadily towards better things.

But strange as it may seem, there are some, doubtless well-intentioned people, who wish to forsake the path that has led us to our present status. However they present their panaceas, it always comes down to the same issue. Shall we abandon the conception that a nation of free men governs and legislates for no class but for all its citizens; that government cannot create wealth though it can regulate and sometimes confiscate it; that there is no theory of politics which will make a strong, self-sustaining people out of weak, dependent men; that wealth and production are the fruit only of individual labor and individual thrift; that effective social organization is not a thing that comes from management proclamation or autocratic direction, but only as citizens have the initiative, the intelligence and the enterprise to organize themselves?

Fund of Eight Billion Dollars
America is the outcome of a philosophy of government and of a succession of experiences wholly its own. It seeks no quarrel with other nations who, as their origin and development have been different, affirm a different creed or follow a different system. But because they are different in all these respects, their creeds and their systems are not for us—if we will but look about us and compare.

By personal effort, forty million of our people have saved a fund which now amounts to over eight billion dollars. Through proper management and the continuance of saving and investment, this fund will suffice with the passing years to pay to these forty million and their families fifty billions of dollars. And all the while these billions, the result of individual work and thrift and free cooperative cooperation will continue to finance the industries of the country, will build new homes and roads, railroads and public utilities and will furnish money to carry on our government.

All the while the great private enterprise will continue to develop character among the people; safeguard the home; train in thrift; spread the gospel of economic sanity and strengthen the virtues of love, loyalty and duty.
