COUNTY ECONOMIC CONFERENCE IN EUGENE NEXT WEEK

This Will Be First County Meet to Follow State Meet Held at Corvallis.

An economic conference for Lane county, the first county conference to follow the state conference recently held at the Oregon Agricultural college, will be held February 13, 14 and 15 at the Eugene chamber of commerce. Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of next week are the days.

What has been recognized as a definite, workable plan for the economic welfare of the agricultural population of the state was adopted at the state conference. It is proposed to follow this with a similar plan for each county of the state.

The plan adopted at Corvallis was the suggestion of representatives of the agricultural interests of the state, who dominated the meeting. The state meet was a success because of the interest shown by the agricultural interests. The success of the county meet depends almost entirely upon the interest shown by the agricultural interests of the county.

One of the interesting groups which will receive consideration at the county meeting is the home economics group. The problems of home life on the farm are to be considered along with farm crops, marketing, etc.

Oregon is the first state of the union to hold an economic conference having for its purpose the improvement of agricultural conditions.

C. G. H. S. WINS IN ONE DEBATE; LOSES IN ANOTHER

The local high school's affirmative team won in the debate with Friday evening at Pleasant Hill between the two schools, by a 3-0 decision. The question was, "Resolved, That a graduated income tax is a desirable feature of the state's system of taxation." The team is composed of Nellie Stewart and Robert Galloway.

The negative team, Ruth Powers and Sam Swartz, debated the same question here Friday evening with the Eugene high school affirmative team and lost in a 2-1 decision. There was a great difference of opinion on the part of the audience as to the fairness of the decision.

ATTENDANCE IN SCHOOLS SHOWS AN INCREASE OF 70

The attendance in the schools shows an increase of 70 over last year. There are now 195 in the high school, as against 166 last year, and 525 in the grades, as against 486 last year, a total of 720, as against a total of 652 a year ago.
