



Advice Given to Prevent Repetition of Such Tragedies as Recent One at Albany.

Because of the interest in the recent tragedy in Albany, where two amilies were wiped out as a result cent tragedy in Albany, where two amilies were wiped out as a result of eating spoiled beans, the follow-ing dissertation on botulism, from he Oregon state board of health, s of interest: Botulism is a deadly food poison. The poison is caused by a toxin many of the foods we cat when the conditions are right. All that

Botulism is a deadly food poison. The name botulism has lost its original significance, which was sausage poisoning. It was thought that the germ that produces the poison causting botulism would grow only in sausage, but it is now known that it will grow in ham, cottage cheese, string beans, corn, asparagus and ripe olives. Botulism is a rare disease but is more common in Europe than in America. In a period of 22 years among approximately 100 million people 150 contracted the disease and 111 died. Therefore it cause of forage poisoning in horses and of limberneek in chickens and turkeys. urkeys.

There has been a marked increase n the number of recorded outbreaks botulism in the United States within the past few years. The present outbrenk in Albany is the only one in the history of Oregon and in the number of cases and rate of fatality is one of the greatest in this country.


