WORTH TAYLOR SUCCEUMS TO WORLD WAR WOUNDS

Norman Ellsworth Taylor, a native of Cottage Grove, died February 8 in a Spokane hospital as the result of injuries sustained in the world war.

Mr. Taylor was known among his friends as "Worth." He was born about eight miles south of Cottage Grove July 14, 1894, and was a descendant of pioneers, being a grandson of Jeremy and Rachel Jones Taylor, who with their parents were pioneers of Lane county, and of Alexander H. and Mary McKnight Powell, who were pioneers of Linn county. In April, 1901, his parents, William Henry and Belle Powell Taylor, moved to Ferry county, Wash., where Worth was employed for several years in the United States forest service. He heard the bugles call and enlisted July 12, 1917, at Vancouver, Wash., enlisting five days later for Camp American university, Washington, D. C., where he was assigned to company E of the 10th engineers.

His company sailed from Hoboken on the transport Carpathia in the early part of September, 1917, and landed at Glasgow, Scotland, October 2, where Worth was left, apparently dead, with cerebrospinal meningitis. After several months spent in hospitals in Great Britain, he reported to the 23rd infantry for duty. He crossed the channel with them and was sent to the lines at Noyon, where he was gassed, shell-shocked and wounded in the head with shrapnel. He arrived home about the first of March, 1919, a physical wreck, but improved slowly and returned to his work in the forest service, also studying forestry in the University of Idaho part of the time. On June 8, 1923, he was married.

Just as hopes were held out that he would fully recover, the old wound in his head caused a clot on the brain and he died February 8.

Ed Blakely in Film.

Ed T. Blakely was much more interested than any other resident of Cottage Grove in the production of "The Covered Wagon," as he was one of those who took part in the making of the picture. He was doing carpenter work for the producing company while that part of the picture was being made which showed the arrival of the "fortyniners" in Oregon. There was a shortage of men to take the parts and ten carpenters were rigged out for the parts, which were not very heavy. Both Mr. and Mrs. Blakely were able to recognize Mr. Blakely.
