SMOKING BY PUPILS IS FOUND COSTLY FOR DISTRICT

Mrs. Hemenway, Springfield Principal, Finds That Smokers Fail in Studies.

Springfield, Ore., Feb. 23.—"Last semester at Lincoln high school there were failures among the pupils not caused by smoking, but there were no known smokers who did not fail." In these words Mrs. Ora Hemenway has described the situation in Springfield, which has caused the public-spirited citizens to organize to investigate the ever increasing smoking among pupils in the public schools.

Mrs. Hemenway, principal of the Lincoln school, said that she has been watching for some time the school work of boys who, she had reason to believe, were using tobacco. She has found the situation alarming. From a financial viewpoint alone, she had estimated that delinquency among the pupils, cigarette smoking and late hours cost the school district \$600 for the Lincoln school alone during the recent semester. This is figured on a basis of the estimated cost per pupil of maintaining the schools, which is \$55.40.

"Of course," she said, "the moral loss due to this delinquency is the most appalling and the thing that the Springfield people are most interested in. However, the taxpayers cannot afford this \$600 loss every semester."

In her position Mrs. Hemenway has been able to observe the effects of the use of tobacco and has come to the conclusion that boys who use it are absolutely unable to carry on their school work. Without an exception they have failed. Aware of the problem, she realized that the evil could be effectively combated only by the citizens of Springfield. So far over a month Mrs. Hemenway has been addressing social and civic organizations at the request of the organizations. She has succeeded in interesting the people in the work.

INCOME TAX IN NUTSHELL.

WHO? Single persons who had net income of \$2,000 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more, and married couples who had net income of \$2,000 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more must file returns.

WHEN? The filing period is from January 1 to March 15, 1924.

WHERE? Collector of internal revenue for the district in which the person lives or has his principal place of business.

HOW? Instructions on Form 1040A and Form 1040; also the law and regulations.

WHAT? Four per cent normal tax on the first \$4,000 of net income in excess of personal exemption and credits for dependents. Eight per cent normal tax on balance of net income. Surtax from 1 per cent to 50 per cent on net incomes over \$6,000 for the year 1923.
