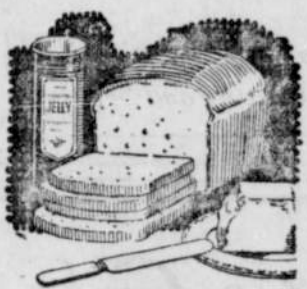

OREGON'S FUTURE IS PICTURED

Tourist Crop Is to Outdistance All Others Except That of the Forests.

A picture of Oregon as a great tourist and industrial state was painted by J. A. Ormandy, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, who was a guest of the commercial club at a noon luncheon held yesterday at Hotel Bartell. He gave the egg crop as ten million dollars, the fruit crop as thirteen millions, the livestock crop as twenty-three millions and the tourist crop as fifteen millions, the latter developed almost entirely within the past few years through advertising. He predicted that within a few years this crop would outdistance in value the product of every basic industry or crop, with the possible exception of the lumber industry.

Mr. Ormandy urged residents of the state to familiarize themselves with what the state has to offer visitors and not leave it to visitors to tell residents what we have here. He derided booster advertising and appealed for businesslike conservative advertising of what the state has to offer.

Cottage Grove's hotel accommodations were highly praised by Mr. Ormandy, as well as by L. L. Graham, of Eugene, district passenger agent, who was also present.

J. H. CONE, NEW ARRIVAL, DIES OF HEART TROUBLE

J. H. Cone, a resident here but a short time, died at his home yesterday morning from heart failure. Funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock today at the chapel, J. H. Ebert officiating. His body will be taken to Portland for burial in the Lone Pine cemetery.

Mr. Cone was born in Wisconsin November 18, 1859. He resided at both Galva, Ill., and Beloit, Kan., where he was married, and came to Oregon 32 years ago. He had been in the lumber business ever since coming to this state. He and his wife, together with their four sons and their families, moved to Cottage Grove from Portland during the latter part of January. Mr. Cone had bought the Anlauf Lumber company sawmill shortly before that time.

He is survived by his wife and the following children: Raymond, Edwin Earl, Ransom L. and Clarence Cone, all of this city, and Mrs. Mabel Yost, of Portland. He is also survived by two brothers, George W. Cone, Portland, and Harlan P. Cone, Washougal, Wash., and a sister, Mrs. Hattie Menendall, Portland.
