PALMER IS CONVICTED ON MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE

(Concluded from first page)
that he called Lammers a vile name but that there was no open hostility and Lammers then went and sat down. Palmer then started for home, he stated.

In his testimony the defendant described the meeting with Lammers on the street and the fatal stabbing. Palmer declared that he could not see who his assailant was as it was dark and he believed that he was about to be robbed, he having about \$30 with him, representing his pay which he had drawn that day.

Had Knife in Hand.
The defendant described how he held the open knife in his hand while separating a piece of candy from the enclosing wrapper. On the stopping of the car across the street and the coming toward him of Lammers, whom he stated positively he did not recognize, Palmer declared that he was rushed off the sidewalk and that in self-defense he swung the knife. It was not until the injured boy had straightened up and turned back toward the car that Palmer saw that Lammers had attacked him, the defendant said.

The defendant, seemingly self-possessed at all times while on the stand, told simply and in order the various connecting events from the encounter in the pool room until he was arrested at his home. At no time did he seem to miss the thread of the narrative and was positive in his declarations concerning each and every point of his story.

District Attorney Johnston, in his cross examination, queried Palmer as to his previous meetings with Lammers and declared that he would show that the stabbing was the culmination of bitter feelings between them. A witness was called by the prosecution to tell of talks with Lammers concerning Palmer and his quarrel with him but on objection of Palmer's attorney this evidence was not allowed and the witness was dismissed.

Other Witnesses Called.
Other witnesses called by the defense were P. C. LaCasse, proprietor of the Buckhorn pool room, who testified to having sold candy to Palmer just before the meeting of the two boys in the pool room in the rear of the place. James H. Palmer, father of the defendant, who sat beside his son during the trial, testified that the boy was wearing his overcoat when he returned home after the encounter with Lammers. This was the only question put to Mr. Palmer on the stand.

Allen St. Clair, a boy of about the same age as the defendant, testified to the meeting in the pool room of the two boys and how Palmer left and then Lammers went out and got into a car with a companion and drove off in the direction taken by Palmer.

G. B. Pitcher, city marshal and deputy sheriff, testified as to the foot prints on the ground at the scene of the fight.

In his opening argument before the jury District Attorney Johnston asked for a conviction on a manslaughter charge as he stated that he did not believe that a verdict of guilty of murder in the second degree would be justified. The prosecutor described the various degrees of homicide and also stressed the point that self-defense should be examined closely for indications of malice, as the evidence pointed strongly toward that, he declared.

The district attorney contended that Palmer did recognize Lammers and stated that Lammers and Harrington in the car were able to see and recognize Palmer as he walked along and that this was ample evidence that Lammers was approached.

"Both boys were undoubtedly at fault and the stabbing was the result of their bitter quarrel," the district attorney stated to the jury. "While self-defense is justified when a person believes that life is in danger or that serious bodily harm may result, there is no evidence to show that Palmer was in mortal fear or danger from Lammers. A man such as Lammers who took without retaliation the vile epithet applied to him in the pool room is not the vicious type of man who would attack to kill or do serious bodily harm," the prosecutor said.

Attorney Allen Addresses Jury.
S. D. Allen, attorney for Palmer, in opening his argument before the jury, stated that the district attorney in asking for a manslaughter verdict instead of that of murder in the second degree, did so as a sort of trade or compromise and that the defense would not stand for a compromise. "Either the defendant was justified in killing Ralph Lammers or he was not," said the attorney. "We do not want a compromise verdict. We want and demand a verdict of acquittal, as it is plain to be seen from the testimony that the defendant acted in self-defense."

Mr. Allen declared that young Palmer had a right under the law to defend himself when he believed that he was being attacked by a robber and even if he had not been under that belief and had known who his assailant was he would have been justified in defending himself from bodily harm.

COAST FISHING RESTRICTED FOR FISHING

Additional restrictions upon fishing in trout streams of this section, with a view of providing for the restocking of the streams, have been made by the state game commission. The restrictions, which become effective April 15, close the Coast fork between Little river and Cottage Grove and all the tributaries between Little river and the source of the Coast fork. All the tributaries of Row river, with the exception of Sharps creek and Mosby creek, have also been closed. Several streams were closed last year.
