OLSON IS WELL PLEASED WITH PROSPECT OF OIL

Makes Statement That Drills at Cottage Grove and Eugene Are in Producing Formation.

Strong indications of oil are reported at the well of the Guaranty Oil company which is drilling on the Eugene Bible university property south of Eugene and the outlook is very encouraging, according to David Eugene Olson, president of the corporation. Mr. Olson stated that the bit is now down over 1200 feet and that paraffin and petroleum are being brought up in the bailer, with the prospects much better than were expected at this depth.

The hole is fully cased with 12½-inch casing, is perfect in every way and is undoubtedly one of the best drilling operations in the west, according to Mr. Olson, who recently visited all the big producing fields of California, Texas and Oklahoma. Although Mr. Olson said that he is not predicting that oil will be struck until the drill is down farther, he expressed the belief that the excellent showing now being made may develop a producer before that time.

The Cottage Grove rig, which is also being operated by Mr. Olson and his associates, is now down about 800 feet and formations similar to those struck at the Eugene well are reported, he stated.

MULTNOMAH COMMISSIONERS ARE ALSO ON GRILL

Extravagance and Carelessness in Expenditure of County Funds Are the Charges.

Lane county is not to be the only county to have a recall. It has been robbed of its exclusiveness and can no longer put on airs.

Multnomah is now putting on a similar stunt that bids fair to outdo the Lane county effort. It is proposed to recall the county commissioners of that county upon much the same grounds as in Lane—unbelievable extravagance and carelessness in the expenditure of public funds, especially in the letting of contracts to large corporations. As in Lane county, bridge contractors seem to have been particularly favored. As in Lane county, the low bid was rejected and the work was given to a favored contractor at a figure that meant a huge loss to the county.

There is this difference in the proposed recall in Multnomah, when the commissioners there were caught with the goods on them they withdrew their names from the contract. There is this difference, too, the grand jury is to get into action, as many think it should in Lane.
