License Money Received. The county treasurer has received from the state treasurer the sum of \$46,178.44, representing Lane county's one-fourth share of the motor vehicle license fees collected in this county from September 16, 1923, to March 15, 1924. The amount is considerably larger than that which Lane county received a year ago, due to the increase in the number of automobiles here.

The total amount of motor vehicle license fees collected in Lane county during that period was \$190,840.92. The Lane county apportionment will go into the fund to pay the interest on the county road bonds.

WEATHER CONDITIONS ARE GOOD; ROAD WORK STARTS

Because of favorable weather conditions, road work over the county will start earlier than usual this year and the county commissioners already have several crews busy. Extensive improvements are to be made on the Row river road under the supervision of John Wright. Among these improvements are a new road around Currin hill to do away with the narrow grade at this point and a new piece of road at a point near the Currin bridge to avoid a low place in the road near the river.

A crew of men is also at work cutting down and grading the road over Knox hill and grading the new section of road which is to eliminate the two corners at the George Miller place.

Work upon the new portion of the Lorane road also will be pushed to completion. There are several places in this road where the rock has disappeared in the mud and it will be necessary to rebuild the road at these points. This road has

been greatly improved by the removal of mud from the soggy places. J. A. Elledge is in charge of this work.

\$200,000 ROAD BONDS SOLD BY LANE COUNTY COURT

Seven bids were received for Lane county's road bond issue of \$200,000 sold last week and the bonds were sold for a premium of \$1514. This is a part of the \$2,000,000 issue voted several years ago and of which there is little left. The \$200,000 will be used on eight road projects in the county this year but, according to present estimates, there will be \$27,000 left over which will go into the bond emergency fund where the court may use it on any

of the projects where additional funds are required. The bonds draw five per cent interest and will run from 4 to 23 years.
