out of Eugene and far from the madding crowd upon the last day that the Nease contract could have been arranged for in the budget. He might explain the early morning telephone call at the Roney home upon that day, followed by a race down the highway from the north by an automobile in which Mr. Nease was a passenger, with the result that barely in the nick of time Mr. Roney was taken from a Southern Pacific train bound for Florence. Doesn't this suggest that Mr. Nease saw the rottenness in the Nease contract and was taking a subtle method of saving the county a bunch of money?

Mr. Horton is very liberal with taxes on timber lands. I challenge him to make a statement showing exactly what he would be willing to take for his other property, personal and real, and follow that with a statement of the county assessment of such property. If Mr. Horton will do this he probably will show the assessor that his property is assessed at about 20 per cent and he will perform a patriotic duty by showing that the timber is not the only property paying upon a small valuation.

Speaking of property escaping taxation, Commissioner Sharp should be able to give some valuable information for the assessor. He testified that a small strip taken off of 40 acres was worth \$3000, while the whole parcel was assessed at \$660.

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

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
