Largest Policy In World Insures Railroad Workers For Over Tenth of Billion



NINETY thousand railroad employees, insured in a single group, will benefit by a policy just issued for \$110,000,000. This contract for over a tenth of a billion is the largest group insurance policy ever issued. The contract was purchased from the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company by the Southern Pacific Railroad and will cover all the employees of the system and its subsidiaries. It is estimated that the company will have to pay claims averaging \$75,000 a month. A group division office has been opened in San Francisco to handle this great co-operative project. The railroad's personnel will have the advantage of the company's welfare service, nursing service, policyholders' service bureau and other distinctive features. The extent of this work is evident from figures recently made public. Last year Metropolitan health nurses made over 2,400,000 visits to the sick in 4,000 cities and towns. The company assisted in over 350 health campaigns and at present is giving its support to a nation-wide movement for the prevention of diphtheria by means of the Schick tests.

The employees of the great rail system, with their families, will receive the protection provided by these various activities. Their scope will extend up and down the Pacific Coast and throughout the Southwest and will affect the men and women who have played an important part in the development of that part of the country. The history of the Metropolitan's Group Life Insurance plan dates back seven years. It has developed to such an extent that the company has 1,700 corporations carrying insurance for their employees. The plan is described as "a big co-operative movement between capital and labor." Group insurance is making available valuable data on health, absenteeism, labor-turnover, accidents, and loss of life of individuals in American industry. The records, assembled in the Metropolitan's research department, together with the results obtained from surveys made of various occupations, may be procured upon request.

Mrs. Nicholas Brady's Gift Of Club to New York Girls Brings Unique Innovations

"We will fit into our clothes by spring!" This is the "bouncer's class" yell at the Carroll Club, of New York, and from all appearances, the members will realize this laudable ambition. For the Carroll girl "bouncer" is not, as the name implies, persons whose duty it is to eject noisy patrons from places of refreshment, but a hard working group of young women who have a keen desire to keep within reasonable limits of avoirdupois and silhouette. The bouncer class was organized several months ago by the physical director of the Carroll Club—an organization composed entirely of business and professional young women—and the only qualification for membership was that the applicant be at least fifteen pounds overweight. Since its inception it has been one of the most popular of the Carroll "gym" classes, but the membership has fallen away to about twenty due to the fact that many of the original members soon became so agile and supple under the

strict regime that there was actual danger of their becoming too thin. The Carroll Club is a gift to New York's business girls from Mrs. Nicholas F. Brady, prominent society leader, who dedicated it to the memory of her mother, Mrs. Mary Carroll Garvan, after whom the club is named. The Carroll Club differs from the ordinary feminine club of the city in that it provides for the accomplishment of a program with certain definite cultural and educational aims as well as affording its 1500 members all the social and recreative advantages of the expensive club. In this respect the Carroll Club is the pioneer in its particular field in Greater New York. As a tribute to Mrs. Brady and to celebrate its fifth birthday, the Carroll Club gave its first annual dinner and reception in the huge gymnasium of the building on February 9th. Six hundred girls of the organization joined in expressing their appreciation of the club founder's efforts in their behalf.
