Junction City Defiant. Junction City, Ore., June 5.—The city council, following a published attack by George Brandenburg, editor of the Motorist, official organ of the Oregon State Motor associa-

tion, has announced that tourists, whether members of the association or not, must respect the laws when passing through this city. The council has further ruled that when the laws are broken, whether through speeding or from other causes, the driver shall be arrested and prosecuted.

Mr. Brandenburg, in his article, threatened to boycott this city and to "camp on the trail" of Officer Shortess unless conditions here changed. The council has instructed the officer to continue making arrests for violations of the motor vehicle law and has also informed him that there is no privileged class here.
