ANDERSON & MIDDLETON MAY PURCHASE W. L. & E.

The purchase of the property of the Western Lumber & Export company, which went into the hands of receivers a year ago, is under consideration by Anderson & Middleton, although no definite offer has been made.

Indebtedness against the company amounts to more than \$150,000 but Anderson & Middleton are not considering paying that figure. The district court has ordered the owners of the property to appear in court July 30 and show cause why the property should not be sold for \$95,000, but Anderson & Middleton have made no definite offer to pay that figure, although mill men generally consider the property worth about that amount.
