Charter Amendment.

AN ACT to amend the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon, by adding a new Chapter thereto authorizing and empowering the Common Council of the City to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City to the amount of twenty-five thousand (\$25,000.00) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose of building and constructing trunk sewer lines in said city as follows: One trunk sewer to be known as the Chestnut Avenue Trunk Sewer, one to be known as the Second Street-Madison Avenue-Third Street-Adams Avenue Trunk Sewer, and one to be known as the Sixth Street-Quincy Avenue-Tenth Street Trunk Sewer.

THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Be It Enacted by the Electors of the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon: Section 1. That the Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City to the amount of twenty-five thousand (\$25,000.00) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose of constructing trunk sewers in said City as follows: One trunk sewer to be known as the Chestnut Avenue Trunk Sewer, one to be known as the Second Street-Madison Avenue-Third Street-Adams Avenue Trunk Sewer, and one to be known as the Sixth Street-Quincy Avenue-Tenth Street Trunk Sewer.

Section 2. The bonds hereby authorized shall be denominated "Trunk Sewer Bonds"; they shall be a general obligation of the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon, in denominations of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars each and to mature serially in numerical order at the rate of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars beginning with and including the year 1925 up to and including the year 1929, and thereafter beginning with and including the year 1930 up to and including the year 1944 at the rate of fifteen hundred (\$1500.00) dollars per year, said bonds to bear interest at not to exceed five per cent (5%) per annum from date thereof, payable semi-annually at the City Treasurer's office in Cottage Grove, Oregon, and the city reserves the right to retire any or all of said bonds before ten (10) years from date thereof.

Section 3. The Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove is hereby authorized and directed and shall include in its general municipal tax levy each year sufficient special levy to pay the interest on the bonds and to provide for the payment of the principal thereof when due.

Section 4. The Common Council of the City is hereby authorized to issue and sell said bonds from time to time as they may be needed for the purpose herein specified, but before any of them shall be sold they shall be advertised for sale by the publication of a notice asking for bids therefor to be published at Cottage Grove, Oregon, once a week for three (3) successive and consecutive weeks prior to the time of the sale, and they may also give notice of sale of said bonds in such other papers as they may deem to be best for the interests of the City in effecting a sale, but if no satisfactory bids for the purchase of the bonds be received they may sell them at private sale, but no sale either at public or private sale shall be made for less than the face value of said bonds and accrued interest.

Section 5. Said bonds shall not be taken or considered as a part of the bonded indebtedness limitation provided in Section 3 of Chapter XI or other section or chapter of the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove, but are hereby specially authorized by a vote of the people of the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon.

Section 6. The funds arising from the sale or disposal of all bonds provided for in this Act shall be known as "Trunk Sewer Fund" and shall be kept separate and apart from all other funds of the City of Cottage Grove and shall only be used to pay the costs and expenses that may be incurred by the City of Cottage Grove in the construction and building of such trunk sewers.
