Petition granted from property owners on Ash avenue asking that sidewalk line be set back one foot from the property line in order to save a number of shade trees.

Frank Peoples appeared to answer complaint filed by Water Commissioner Pitcher that he had cut a number of trees on the city's west side watershed. Peoples stated that if he had done so it was because he had been misinformed as to the boundary line of the city's property. A settlement was effected whereby Mr. Peoples agreed to pay \$2.50 the thousand for all timber cut and to reimburse the city for all expense incurred in establishing the fact that trees had been cut on city property.

Petition granted for the paving of Tenth street, from Villard court north to city limits, with class A macadam and ordinance for the improvement enacted.

Permit granted Mrs. Anna J. Gowdy for erection of residence on Adams avenue.

Permit granted Mr. Haskins to replace roof of residence, roof having been recently burned.

City attorney instructed to foreclose on several pieces of property for delinquent assessments.

Woodard mill and the Southern Pacific fire plant extinguished it in about 30 minutes. Some poles belonging to Lyman Adams were endangered but no property was destroyed.

Devers, attorney for the state highway commission, who was in Eugene a few days ago. Material is already on the ground for the erection of a shed to house machinery and supplies.
