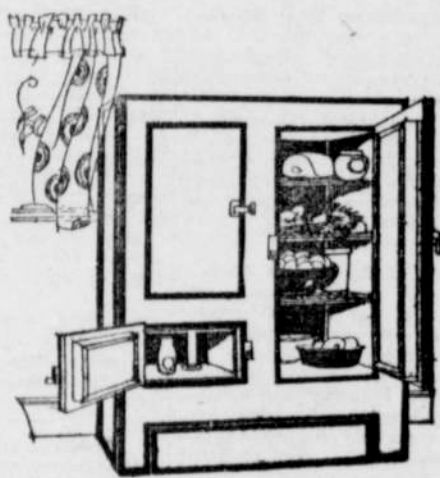

California growers are buying cooperatively under the university extension service with W. M. Regan, chief of dairying at the Davis farm, in charge.
