STATE ASKED TO TAKE OVER ALL OF MCKENZIE

An effort will be made by the Lane county court to induce the state highway commission to take over the entire McKenzie highway from Springfield to Blue River next year. County Judge C. P. Barnard will take the question up with the commission at its next meeting.

The state now has charge of maintaining 30 miles of the highway between these two points, having accepted a number of sections of the road which have been brought up to state standards.

NEASE BELIEVES TIMBER LAND TO BE UNDERASSESSED

His Report on 108,193 Acres Is for a Fourth of Timbered Area of County.

A large amount of Lane county timber land is underassessed, according to M. G. Nease, who has presented the county with his report upon the cruise of 108,193 acres, ordered by the former county commissioners, Emmett Sharp and L. N. Ronney. Assessor Nease believes that the cruise should continue until all the timber land in the county has been covered. As there is no opposition to the cruise and as the present commissioners favor a cruise, it is probable that the wishes of the assessor will be complied with.

Mr. Nease also presented the county with a bill for \$25,342.61, the agreed price for the work at 22 1/2 cents the acre.

The report shows more than six and one half billion feet of timber on this 108,193 acres. According to Assessor Nease there is a total of 455,564 acres of privately-owned timber land in the county.

Mr. Nease claims that his report shows that Lane county needs a complete cruise. He estimates that there is no less than 30 billion feet of privately owned timber in the county.

The cruise was taken in 13 townships scattered over the county. It reveals many sections rich in timber that were hitherto considered to have little timber, according to Mr. Nease. Some of the quarter sections showed more than twenty million feet. One section containing 90,389,000 feet, averaged 141,000 feet to the acre, nearly all of yellow fir.

The cruise report is filed in a handsome, gold stamped volume, bound in morocco, 20 by 25 inches in size. It weighs upwards of 75 pounds and is kept in the vault at the assessor's office. More than 500 maps in colors, showing the nature of the land and all features controlling timber values, are included in the book.

GANG OF SIUSLAW LIQUOR LAW VIOLATORS ARRESTED

Five lower Siuslaw men, including Buck and Claude Mowbrader, Ben Wright, M. S. Johnson and Cornelius Buchanan, are in the custody of Lane county officers, some of them charged with the sale and others with unlawful possession of liquor. The arrest was made Sunday night in the vicinity of Florence and the men are said to be the worst gang of liquor violators encountered in a long time. Wright put up a hard fight against the deputy who arrested him. Twenty-five gallons of liquor in kegs and the same amount of bottled liquor was confiscated.

STATE TRAFFIC OFFICERS ARE GETTING SPEEDERS

Salem, Ore., Aug. 20.—Fines aggregating \$5429 were imposed by the courts as a result of the activities of the state traffic officers during July, according to a report prepared by T. A. Rafferty, in charge of the law enforcement bureau of the state motor vehicle department.

Delinquent fees sent into the state department as a result of the activities of the traffic officers totaled \$3729 and the resale value of stolen cars recovered was \$3250. Licenses issued to foreign cars as the result of warnings issued by the traffic officers aggregated \$15,584.

There were 201 arrests for speeding. Reckless driving resulted in 22 arrests, while 10 persons were held for switching license plates.

In the state outside of Portland 425 accidents were reported.

Approximately 130 were due to reckless driving, while 21 accidents were caused by driving on the wrong side of the street. Intoxi-

cated drivers arrested numbered 46, as against less than half that number last month. Failure to give proper signals resulted in 27 arrests, while 19 arrests were made for improper parking of cars.
