In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Lane County.
Fred Ernest, Plaintiff, vs D. N. McInturff and Eugenia L. McInturff, his wife, H. S. McInturff, Bank of Cottage Grove, a corporation, Dora J. DeVere and C. O. DeVere, her husband, J. W. McCoy and Lane County, a municipal corporation, Defendants.
To: D. N. McInturff and Eugenia L. McInturff, his wife, H. S. McInturff, Bank of Cottage Grove, a corporation, Dora J. DeVere and C. O. DeVere, her husband, J. W. McCoy and Lane County, a municipal corporation:

You and each of you are hereby summoned and required to appear and answer the Complaint of Plaintiff, filed in the above entitled cause, within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this Summons, if published, and within six weeks from date of personal service on you without the State of Oregon, by service upon you a copy of the Summons and Complaint, if served outside the State of Oregon, or in lieu of publication, and if you fail to appear and answer within the time prescribed, the Plaintiff will apply to the Court for a judgment against you for the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) together with interest thereon at the rate of Seven (7) per cent per annum from the 20th day of April, 1923, and for the further sum of One Hundred and Twenty-five Dollars (\$125.00) reasonable attorney's fee; and for the Plaintiff's costs and disbursements of this suit; and that a mortgage upon the following described premises:

Beginning at a point 19.99 chains South of the Northwest corner of the Jacob Klinesmith Donation Land Claim No. 76, thence running East 25.96 chains, thence South 9.63 chains, thence West 25.96 chains, thence North 9.63 chains to the place of beginning containing Twenty-five acres of land, more or less, all in the Northwest Quarter of Section 31, Township 20, South of Range Three West of Willamette Meridian, in Lane County, State of Oregon,

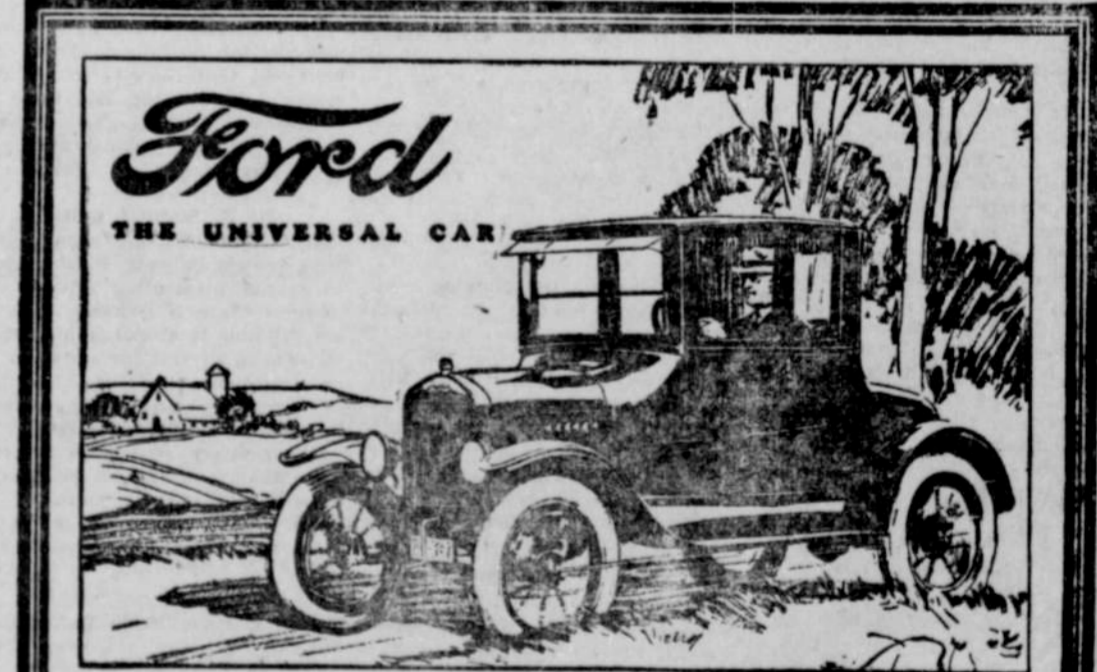
