Wm. Lamere Did Not Live Here

A Roseburg dispatch on Monday stated that William Lamere, who was killed there Sunday, was a resident of Cottage Grove. He was an uncle of Mrs. O. L. Jones, of this city, but was a resident of Roseburg and was employed at Astoria. The dispatch read as follows:

"Roseburg, Ore., Nov. 26.—William Lamere, of Cottage Grove, formerly a resident of Roseburg, was killed yesterday evening about 7:30 o'clock when he was struck by an automobile driven by Sam Shell, of Oakland, about a half mile north of Roseburg. Lamere evidently was walking along the highway when he was struck and dragged about 200 feet. Shell's car turned over a 10-foot bank and landed upside down in the ditch. Shell, upon being removed from underneath the wreckage of his car, started to run but was captured and placed under arrest. He is badly dazed but not injured. Lamere died within a few minutes after being struck, his body being mangled. He leaves a wife and two small children. He moved from Roseburg to Astoria about a year ago and a month ago went to Cottage Grove. He was called to Roseburg last week by the critical illness of his aged mother.
