There are so many faked Rembrandts in existence that few prospective purchasers will complete a deal for one of the great Dutchman's works without consulting an expert.

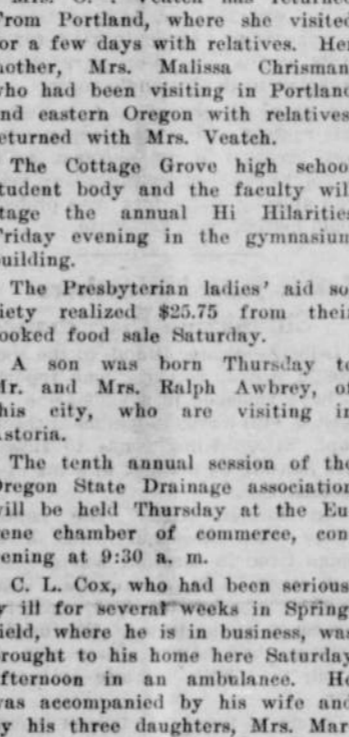
Just now an unusually active business in faked furniture is reported. "This is an age of faked furniture," said the proprietor of a West End gallery.

"Most of it is sold in the first place for what it is, accurate imitation, but later it comes into the market in the ordinary way to be sold as the real thing."
