## World Sports Favored By Spearow

"The International Significance of Athletics" was the theme of an address delivered by Ralph Spearow, world's champion pole vaulter, at the University of Oregon assembly Thursday forenoon.

Spearow added a humorous vein to his lecture by giving some of his impressions of France, England and Japan. "The things that impressed me most about Paris were the taxis and their drivers together with the French museums; without these, there would be no Paris," was his summary of his impressions of France.

After having spent close to six months in a strictly athletic atmosphere, Mr. Spearow has taken a rather decided stand along with the other Olympic game contestants in championing international athletic competition.

"International relations," stated Mr. Spearow, "start in a small local way and grow to international importance. The same is true of athletics, which started with Greek athletes traveling around different countries giving exhibitions of their skill, but today athletics have assumed international significance."

"The Olympic games give every nation a chance to meet others on an equal basis, which is not true in politics, commerce or any other connections between nations."

In concluding Mr. Spearow emphasized the importance of religion in connection with athletic participation.
