Misses Marjorie and Muriel Shay are home from Roseburg for the holidays with their parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Shay.

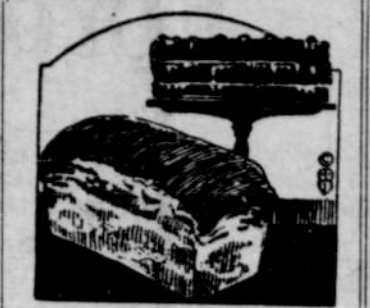
