IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON you and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the Amended Complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause within six weeks from the date of publication hereof, which is the date of the first publication hereof, and if you fail so to appear and answer on or before the last day of the time prescribed in the Order for Publication hereof, to-wit, January 14, 1926, for want thereof, the plaintiff will take judgment and decree against you and each of you to the effect that the plaintiff is entitled to the relief demanded in plaintiff's said Amended Complaint, a succinct statement of which is: That the plaintiff recovers of and from defendants Coast Range Lumber company, the full sum of \$193,500.00 together with interest thereon at the rate of 6% per annum; that first day of July, 1923, and the further sum of \$3,568.95 together with interest thereon from the 24th day of April, 1925, at 7% per annum, and the further sum of \$276.67 together with interest thereon from the 29th day of August, 1925, at 7% per annum and the further sum of \$2,914.09 together with interest thereon at the rate of 7% per annum from the 31st day of October, 1925, and the further sum of \$19,350.00, reasonable attorney's fees and \$2,000.00 trustee's fees and for plaintiff's costs and disbursements; that the said amounts aforesaid be adjudged to be a first and prior lien upon the property described in the Amended Complaint, hereinafter set forth; that the sheriff of Lane county, Oregon, in book 31, page 126, Records of Mortgages of Lane county, Oregon, be foreclosed as a mortgage and the property herein described be sold under execution in such lots or parcels, or in one lot or parcel, as will bring the highest and best price and the proceeds of such sale be applied first to the expenses of said sale, next to the costs and disbursements of this suit, then to the reasonable attorney's fees, then to the trustee's fees, and the amount advanced by plaintiff and adjudged due it for insurance, abstracts, taxes and then to the other amounts advanced by plaintiff from the defendants Coast Range Lumber company, with interest on said various sums from the date of said decree and the overplus of the proceeds of such sale to be paid to the defendants in order of the court; that execution issue for the enforcement of said decree, and that the plaintiff may become a purchaser at said sale, and that the sheriff of Lane county, Oregon, in making said sale, put the purchaser or purchasers in possession of the property ordered sold, and that the defendants and all persons claiming by, through or under said defendants, or any of them, be barred and foreclosed of all right, title, claim, interest and equity in and to the property so sold subject after the time for redemption has expired; that in case plaintiff is a purchaser at said execution sale, the amount of its bid may be credited on the judgment or decree which it may obtain herein to the extent of the amount of said bid, and that the plaintiff may, at its option, have its relief as to the costs and charges met and equitable; that the real property aforesaid is located in Lane and Clatsop counties, Oregon, and is described as follows, to-wit:
