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Legislature Sidelights

State Capitol, Salem, Ore., Jan. 12—The legislative session seems almost like a reunion of present and former residents of Cottage Grove and Eugene.

Of course there are the three members of the house and the two members of the senate from Lane. Then there are Representative Herbert Gordon, former resident of Eugene, now chairman for the fifth time of the powerful ways and means house committee; Representative R. S. Hamilton, of Bend, former Eugene attorney; Representative A. M. Collier, of Klamath Falls, formerly of Eugene and son of a former county engineer of Lane county; Representative A. R. Ford, of Dayville, a resident of Eugene back in 1902; Elbert Bede, reading clerk of the house; George J. Willett, of Cottage Grove, mailing clerk of the senate; W. S. Roerts, hero of San Juan hill and resident of Fox Hollow, who is to be second assistant sergeant-at-arms; Ulysses S. Walker, assistant sergeant-at-arms, former resident of Cottage Grove, now of Portland; Alta King, of Eugene attorney and former city recorder; Linn Nesmith, who is a former resident of Eugene and always on the job here; Miss Collier, Eugene stenographer, employed in that capacity by Senator Fisk; Miss Margaret Scott, of Cottage Grove, University of Oregon School of Journalism graduate, who is serving her second session here as a reporter for the Oregon Voter; Miss Fritsch Goodrich, of Eugene, who is looking the session and the members over and may remain; W. G. D. Mercer, Veteran Sergeant-at-arms and chaplain of the Senate, and probably several other major or minor lights whom I have overlooked.

Of course there is the irrepressible Tom Campbell, who frequently graces the rotunda of one house or the other with his glowing countenance when not engaged in performing the duties of a public service commission and once a prominent resident of Cottage Grove; also J. M. Devers, who as attorney for the highway commission, has to spend much time waiting on the members of the session and getting their roads and highway bills into proper shape; he was once Lane county's district attorney.

Although Judge Potter is a new member of the house he seems to be well and favorably known among the members. He is spoken of as certain to become an influential legislator.

Representative Halvor C. Wheeler, known to all the old members from past service, is frequently referred to as hard-headed, clear-thinking, capable member of the house, a reputation which he has earned by taking a keen interest in legislation, by being ever on the job, having missed probably not a single roll call in his entire membership in the house, by saying nothing when he has nothing to say and something to the point when there is something to be said upon a subject with which he is familiar or which his committee has handled or with which he is familiar and in which he is interested.

Representative Howard is the heavyweight of the house and is within a few pounds of exactly the same weight as Ed Bailey, who served from Lane two years ago. That weight is in the neighborhood of 200 pounds.

Spencer Burdick is said to be the youngest man who has ever held that position in the Oregon house. His age is given as 32.

The weather is clear and bright outside today, but there is a flood of jobseekers, cosmetic and otherwise, in both houses.

Wheeler and Wilson again come together on the house roll call. The reading clerk has suggested that he should receive a fee from a certain well known manufacturer article for the stenographer advertising he is giving it.

The house does not have social sessions, despite the fact that it has Coffey and a Teegarden in its membership.

To the list of Lane county residents and former residents who are participating in the Lane county reunion here should be mentioned D. A. Elkins, of Eugene, and Chester Noland, of Creswell, democrats and employees of the state accident commission, also Mrs. Clarabelle Buff, chief clerk of the enrolled bills committee of the house and once a resident of Sagnaw as Miss Clarabelle Taplin.

PORT DEVELOPMENT HELD INDUSTRIAL NEED

Portland Conference Takes Up the Question of Federal Aid for Coast Harbors.

In the interest of greater development for the coast ports of the state by the federal government Governor Walter M. Pierce has called a conference to meet in Portland January 16 and 17 the results of which are expected to have an important bearing on lumbering and other industries in the Willamette valley.

The committee appointed to arrange for the gathering, I. N. Day, Portland, chairman; Louis E. Bean, Eugene; and Russell J. Hubbard, Reedsport, have prepared a program designed to attract the attention of all interested in industrial development in the valley. This committee has asked each community to designate and authorize a representative to advance the claims of his district and port for recognition in the conference.

According to Mr. Day there are in Tillamook, Lincoln, Lane, Douglas, Coos, Curry, Jackson and Josephine counties on government owned land, 100,101,577,000 board feet of timber, much of it overmatured and turning to decay. There, also, are 96,820,000,000 board feet in private ownership and in the same condition. It can not now be marketed primarily because of transportation difficulties.

In Tillamook, Lincoln, Lane, Douglas, Coos, and Curry counties there are 9,457,520 acres. Of this 4,659,964 acres are within the boundaries of national forests, Oregon and California and Coos Bay land grants. On these government owned acres stand 87,800,000,000 board feet of timber. The same six counties have in addition a combined area of 4,816,556 acres of privately owned land, containing 90,000,000 board feet of standing timber.

In the eight Oregon counties mentioned the federal government and private holdings are practically the same not only in acreage but in board feet measurement as well. The government stands on a 50-50 basis of land and timber ownership with private owners.

Up to June 30, 1923, there were appropriated for harbor improvement work along the coast of this district \$8,204,733.07. Of this sum \$7,192,454.45 has been expended. These figures are exclusive of Columbia river work. The various port districts by bonding themselves to the limit have expended \$3,039,129.70. Private owners in the district paid in taxes, for 1922 alone the sum of \$5,263,796.22 no part of which came from holdings of the federal government.

At \$1.50 per thousand feet (considered a conservative estimate) the federal government has a standing timber investment of \$150,000,000 in the counties mentioned, while the value of the private holdings on the same basis total \$145,230,000. The grand total valuation is \$295,230,000. It is considered that the only feasible outlet is through the sea gates along the coast. The government has authorized for the development of these gate ways but \$8,204,733 and the work is far from complete with present contracts fully expended. Ocean transportation, with its cheap rates, would make possible the marketing of this timber along the Atlantic seaboard and overseas, while lack of such transportation condemns it to stand and rot.

Mr. Day says, "The federal government stands in the role of an absentee landlord, holding half the territory under discussion, drawing revenue from its people but giving little or nothing in direct return. The people resident there have taxed themselves to the limit of their ability for the purposes of growth and development.

"Twelve million acres of most fertile soil, with a climate noted for its mildness, should sustain more than 125,000 people.

"Therefore I hold it to be true that the government at Washington owes it to its people in Oregon as a moral duty as well as to its own interest as a business duty to open its harbors to ships and its territory to impatiently waiting opportunity."
