Maglady Introduces Bill for Armory

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Ore., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—A bill for an armory at Cottage Grove will appear in the senate tomorrow, with Senator J. S. Maglady as its author. There are three other armory bills before the session, but Cottage Grove is conceded first position in case any armory appropriations are made, having been made this promise two years ago when its bill was turned down. Adjutant General White stands squarely for the Cottage Grove armory first, but that any armory appropriation will be made is not certain. Cottage Grove has already voted the bonds for the city's share.

FIRST CHARTER OF CITY ADOPTED 26 YEARS AGO

Even corrections which have been marked in with lead pencil are perfectly clear.

An item in the "Bohemia Nugget," for January 27, 1899, shows that Governor T. T. Geer signed the charter for the consolidated city of Cottage Grove on January 24, 1899. According to the provisions of this charter the mayor of Lemati at the time of its adoption was to become mayor of the consolidated city. Two of the councilmen of Lemati and three of the councilmen of Cottage Grove were to make up the new council.

O. F. Knox was then mayor of Lemati and the position of mayor fell upon him when the consolidation went into effect. He was the father of Frank Knox, present proprietor of the Gray Goose restaurant and an uncle of O. O. Veatch. At one time he was candidate for county judge and lacked only one vote of getting the office. In fact, when the election returns were first announced, he believed he had received the office and moved to Eugene to take up his duties. A closer count, however, gave the office to his opponent C. J. Fitch, by one vote.

S. R. Piper, one of the Lemati councilmen, who went into the council of the consolidated city is now living on a farm on the Coast Fork. He was at one time in the hardware business here.

W. F. Hemenway, brother of D. H. Hemenway of this city, was the other member of the Lemati council to hold over to the administration of the new city. He left Cottage Grove in 1901 for Seattle, Wash., and went from there to Glendale, California, where he now lives.

J. I. Jones, now living in Eugene, was a councilman on the west side of the river in what was originally Cottage Grove and took his place in the new council. Others from that side who went into the council were G. U. Snapp and J. W. Gowdy, both of whom are now dead.

H. C. Veatch, who became treasurer, was the father of O. O. Veatch. He died two years ago at the age of 93. Warren McFarland, who now lives on the west side of the river and is working for the Bohemia Lumber company, was the first marshal of Cottage Grove after the consolidation.

E. W. Whipple was mayor on the west side at about the time of the division of the two towns. The postoffice on the east side was established where the Central hotel now is and Frank Wooley became postmaster.

The new charter provided that the first election should be held the first Monday in April, 1899. The results of this election held April 3, were: Mayor, Darwin Brislow; treasurer, H. Eakin; recorder, J. S. Medley; councilmen, 1st ward, G. H. Stone, two years, W. S. Bennett, one year; 2nd ward, W. S. Chrisman, two years, B. Lurch, one year; 3rd ward, Wm. Cummings, two years, G. M. Hawley, one year.

The two year councilmen were evidently elected for the purpose of keeping all the terms of council members from expiring at once. This was done regardless of a provision in the charter stating that no term of office should be longer than one year. Even in those days speed was a matter of much concern with lawmakers. council power: "To regulate the rate of speed upon all railroads or other roads within the corporate limits and to prevent fast or furious riding or driving upon the streets and alleys therein."

Also the council could "say by ordinance whether or not any bicycles, tricycles, or similar wheeled vehicles, or any steam engine or portable steam or traction engine or harvesting machinery shall be driven through in running order or publicly conveyed through any streets or alley in the city and designate upon what streets or alleys the same may be done or prohibited."

The license fee for selling liquor was fixed at not more than \$800 a year. It was also provided that anyone selling or giving liquor to drunkards, minors, Indians or women should be fined not less than \$25 or more than \$100.

The council was given the power to prevent the selling of cigars, cigarettes and tobacco to minors.

If the soil is used, 200 to 300 pounds of the surface soil should be scattered over each acre of the land to go to peas. It is harrowed in promptly. Exposure to the sunlight is injurious to the bacteria that are in this soil. Sowing should take place under cloudy conditions or toward evening, if possible.
