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Legislative Sidelights

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Ore.
Jan 27.—Representative Woodward, of Multnomah, must be a keen legislator. He certainly is a good judge of human nature.

Sam Vench, pioneer of Cottage Grove, veteran of the operating department of the Southern Pacific and possibly the oldest living conductor in point of service, is a visitor under the big dome. He isn't interested in any thing in particular. He takes a vacation during each biennial session just to come here and watch the wheels go around.

A bill has been introduced to provide an appropriation for an egg-laying contest. It is understood that the "chickens" attending the session are eliminated. Too many of them are cacklers.

"Tilly of Tillamook" is the title of a booklet that has been placed upon the desk of all members. The sub-title is, "Her Temptation and Salvation." The booklet portrays the terrible struggle of a cheese-checked maid from the breezy cheezy, wheezy home of Tilly on the rind who went to Portland to get a job with which to earn money to send home to the folks. During the climax she barely escaped in her teddy bears, whatever they are. The author probably thought that the struggle and salvation of Tilly should encourage the legislators to believe that they may also escape unscathed from terrible temptation.

Colonel Mercer was the subject of a senate resolution that was of a senate resolution that was greatly pleasing to him. The senators are accustomed to themselves using piquant and expressive English and for that reason they were impressed with the beauty and brevity of a prayer delivered by the veteran sergeant-at-arms, who, during recent sessions, has also acted as chaplain. The resolution provides that each member of the senate shall be provided with a printed copy. The state printer is doing it up in the best of typographical form. The colonel's prayers are making a reputation and his brevity might well be imitated by some of the ministers who open the sessions.

Representative Potter is the only member of the Lane delegation in the house who has introduced a bill. His No. 16 is the only one which has come on for consideration and it was acted upon favorably. This was the only bill he had in until he dropped two into the hopper this afternoon.

Senator E. W. Miller, of Josephine, known in many sections of the state as an orator of no mean ability, part of which reputation he acquired while a resident of

Cottage Grove, has proved one of the least boisterous of the members of the upper house. He doesn't intend to try any oratorical flights until there is occasion to do so, in which respect he acts differently than a number of members of that body.

A ripple of laughter followed the reading in the house today of a resolution which had been requested by the governor thanking I. N. Day for the presentation of a comprehensive map of Oregon. Mr. Day is generally thought of as an attaché of big business—the big business which Governor Walt often has catagated. The resolution stated that it was prepared in response to the governor's request and not only thanked Mr. Day for the presentation of the map but also wished him health, long life and prosperity. Representative Lomergan wanted to know whether the authors hadn't gone too far in assuming that the governor wished to wish prosperity for Mr. Day.

If the poultry interests and the fish interests of the state could bring about the right kind of cooperation by crossing the salmon or trout with the Leghorn or Rhode Island Red, some wonderful results should be achieved. The salmon or trout lays a thousand eggs at a sitting. These acquainted with the laying proclivities of the trout and salmon wonder why the streams of the state do not become overstocked. Most of the eggs hatch, as they are given by their mothers a protection of one or two feet of gravel, through which the fry must work their way to the surface, but the moment that the fry appear in the water they become the food for a million enemies. Many birds consider fingerlings a choice delicacy. Nearly all fish have the same gastronomical regard for the little fish and the result is, so expert fish men attending the session say, that not over two or three of the trout produced by a thousand eggs ever reach maturity.

Speaker Burdick is pounding his committees on the back, with the result that at the close of each session a number of important committee meetings are announced. Several committees have been functioning nightly but have produced but little in the way of bills for consideration.

The bills to do away with the state market agent and Prohibition Officer Cleaver are both taking a refreshing nap in committee and have not peeped since introduced and referred.

W. G. Beattie, former school superintendent at Cottage Grove, now one of the faculty of the Oregon normal, was here yesterday in the interest of legislation favorable to an appropriation for that institution.

The biennial fight to put church property onto the tax rolls is again to be made, a bill having that purpose having been introduced by Representative Lewis, who is as yet unable to be present but had Representative Hurlbert introduce the bill for him. This bill differs from other bills which have been presented upon the subject in that property to the amount of \$5,000 would be exempt if actually used for religious or charitable purposes. It is argued that this exemption would care for the large majority of churches but would put onto the tax rolls profit-making institutions owned by churches or charitable organizations.

A number of years ago, James J. Hill, the Empire Builder, was a guest of honor at a banquet held in Duluth, Minn. The Great Northern, Jim Hill's road, and the Northern Pacific were keen competitors for the passenger business between the twin cities and Duluth, at the head of the lakes. One of the speakers related the following experience: "Upon the streets of St. Paul a few days ago an excited individual stopped me and said, 'I want to go to Duluth the worst way.' I advised him to take the Great Northern."

Cliff's Fall Laid Bare Treasure Long Hidden

One of the most dramatic discoveries in the history of archeology occurred when a fall of the cliff near Byblos, Syria, scooped a corner out of a rock-cut tomb over 4,000 years old, the existence of which had long been suspected but never proved.

The slide revealed to a passer-by a huge sarcophagus with a unique lid, having large mushroom-shaped knobs by which, no doubt, it was originally handled. The rock hereabouts is very porous, and a layer of muddy soil, knee deep, which had filtered down through the ages, covered the floor.

In the gallery a further small tomb or grotto was found. The tomb was originally entered by three pits, which were afterward walled in below and filled in above. Among the objects found were anatomical ashes and bone fragments, a lamp of bronze or gold, silver vessels, a goblet of obsidian and gold, two gold salvers, an alabaster case, a bronze vase, and plaques of ivory or luster ware.
