Affection for Oregon Is Found Lacking in South

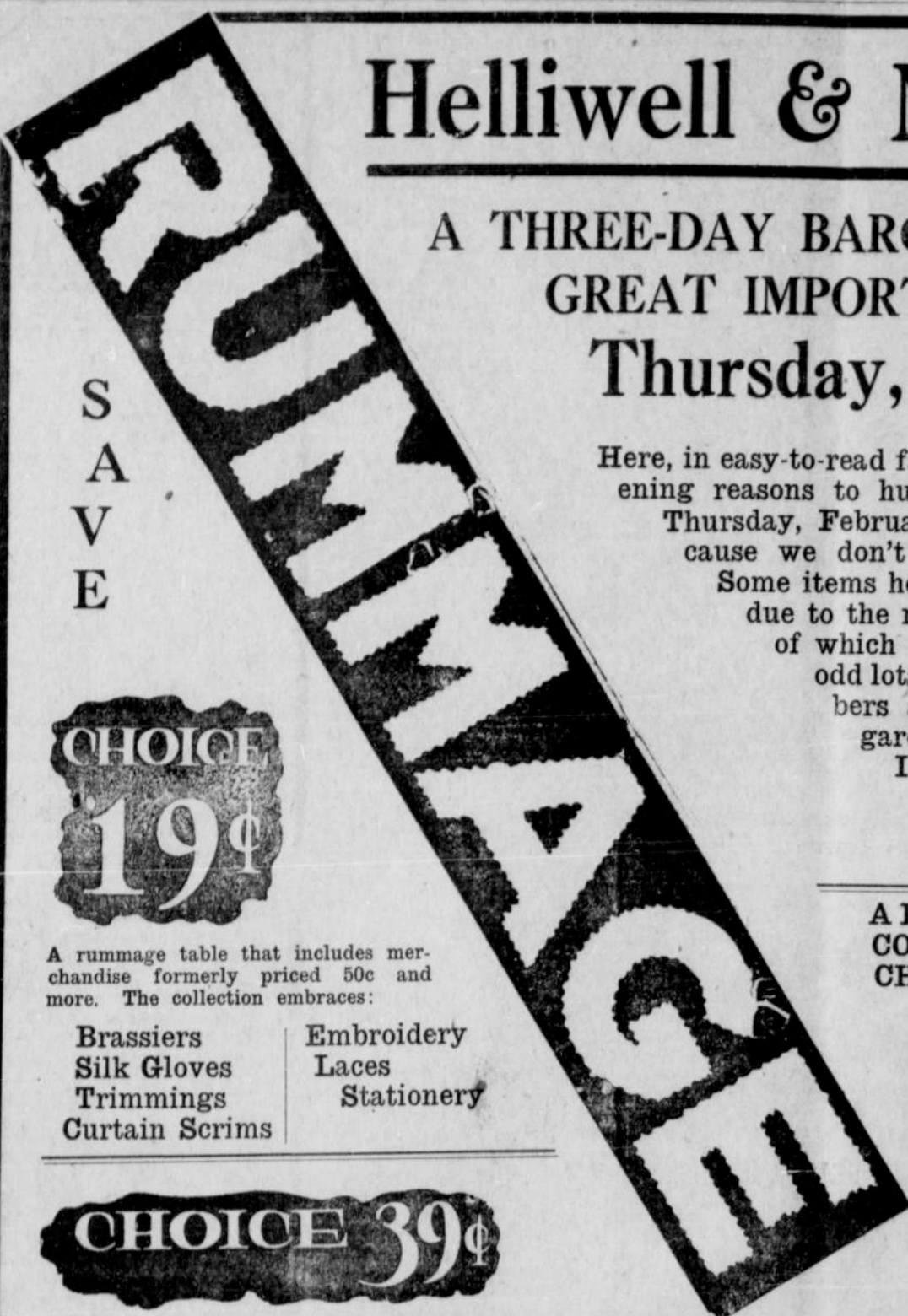
The following is a letter from Mrs. D. O. Byrne, a former resident of Cottage Grove now living in San Diego. Mrs. Byrne left here a short time ago and tells of her trip south in this communication written to Miss Esther Silsby, San Diego, Calif.—Dear Friends: At last we are settled in what is to be our home. We have a nice little bungalow, gas for cooking and heating, but we don't like it for the latter. We are going to try and get a house that has a flue so we can have a real fire. Wood is scarce but we can gather up enough trash to burn to make a little blaze.

They say (just as they do in Oregon) that this is an unusual season and much cooler than ordinary. Today it looks as though we might have rain—which would look good to us. It seemed awfully dry and dusty and they need rain to save the crops. We have been too tired from traveling to look around San Diego. They certainly don't do any boasting for Oregon down here. One never sees the name "Oregon" on anything. They advertise Washington apples and name things after Washington—but they ignore Oregon as though it were nowhere near. We noticed in the hotels that the woolen blankets were made in the east.

When Oregon apples are out for sale they put up signs saying "Fancy Spitz Apples" but take great care never to mention where they are from. We hear all kinds of remarks about Oregon. Everyone turns up his nose when you speak of Oregon climate.

We enjoy the sunshine, but find it cool when not out in it—but of course this is winter. A trip through California is almost like a trip through fertile valleys, fields of grain, beautiful orchards, or large cattle ranges and then for miles and miles one sees nothing but barren waste. No wonder it costs California so much to keep good highways. There is so much unproductive and uninhabitable land. Part of our route lay along the beach and we found it very warm and bright. Along the shores of one bay we saw acres of peas in bloom. Back from the ocean the winds make it much cooler.

We didn't spend much time in San Francisco or Los Angeles—too much traffic. Mother was feeling very bad most of the time which detracted from our enjoyment of the trip.
