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Legislative Sidelights

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Ore., Feb. 2.—(Special.)—Ed Bailey, a heavyweight of the session two years ago, is a visitor here. His weight is 260 pounds, more or less, mostly more. He is succeeded this year by Emmett Howard, also weighing mostly more than 260. In order that the house chamber might not wobble, Mr. Bailey was placed on the opposite side of the chamber from Howard. The privileges of the floor were asked for him by A. E. Hunter, who did not neglect to mention that Mr. Bailey is a democrat.

A resolution, of which Representative Woodward is the author, was introduced in the house today, suggesting a joint session on Lincoln's birthday, to be addressed by Colonel W. G. D. Mercer, sergeant-at-arms and chaplain of the senate, who came into intimate contact with the martyr president through his work as a member of the federal secret service. Colonel Mercer has several times delivered the address for the observation by the legislature of the birthday of the great emancipator.

Usually the speaker does not introduce many bills, but Speaker Burdick has introduced more at this session than he introduced during a number of sessions when he merely had a seat on the floor.

Conrad Olsen, one of the best known authors, having edited the present Oregon code, has been a visitor here for several days. A revision of the laws, to bring them up to date, is proposed and Mr. Olson probably would like to continue in the authorship business. This kind of writing has no uncertainties as to the returns.

Three former speakers have been visiting here during the session. They are L. E. Bean, of Eugene; K. K. Kubli, of Portland, Frank Davey, of Salem or Portland, as the legal lights write their bills. They seem to enjoy watching the animals perform but it looks rather odd to see those, who were the busiest men of the sessions for which they were speakers, seemingly having little to do and with plenty of time to visit with the most humble of those here present, their conversation undisturbed by those rushing about in the interest of some piece of legislation.

Representative Bennett has introduced a bill to appropriate \$5000 for the suppression of contagious diseases of bees. If the bees referred to are the ones who have inoculated a number of legislators with governorship and senatorial ambitions, the appropriation comes too late. The disease which these legislators have contracted is incurable and all who are not already immune have been affected.

Unless those who would establish a health commission and provide

for the issuing of licenses to every known method, or lack of method of treating the halt, the lame and the blind, know more about the practice of the healing art than they do about the drawing of a bill, they are not entitled to a license to practice anything. The bill is written to somewhat resemble the constitution of a crossroads debating society, beginning with article I and going down to article VIII, a style not permissible in the drawing of a bill or proposed law. In the body of the bill appear such words as "ostetric" and "osteopathic," terms not known in any branch of the medical or healing profession.

The newspaper boys attending the session are looking forward with considerable enthusiasm to the biennial "feed" always given for them by Dr. Steiner, superintendent of the state hospital. When the practice of giving these feeds was started a number of the boys hesitated, evidently fearing that they might be mistaken for some of the inmates and might not be able to report for duty the next day, but the fame of the cooking at the hospital has spread and now one of the first things the newspaper boys ask upon their arrival in Salem is "When is the Steiner feed to be held?" Some of the boys have suggested that if the cooking is done by the inmates they are going to go there to pick their second wives.

Colonel W. G. D. Mercer, veteran chaplain of the senate, where the need for prayer has become so great that the colonel has become an expert, invoked the blessings of Diety upon the house Tuesday forenoon, doing so in not over 60 seconds. Incidentally, the day was one of little turmoil.

Colonel B. K. Lawson is here from Wedderburn, where he is manager of the Macleay interests. He says he is not, however, interested in fish legislation. He is president of the Roosevelt highway association and is here looking for two or three million dollars to put the great scenic highway nearer to completion. Lawson has a way of getting what he goes after, but he has a job this time to test his skill as a go-getter.

The fight on the governor, which has been so well advertised, is not all political bunk. There are no democratic members of the legislature who do not admit that the governor has made some grave errors and has proved gullible as a grade school kid upon some occasions, especially upon the occasion of his decision to tear the Port of Portland commission to pieces upon the advice of a rank outsider so far as his administration is concerned.

For the first time I can recollect a bill was withdrawn from the house today by the author while it was under discussion and after it had come from the committee with unanimous favorable report. The onslaught was so great that the author saw that it could not weather the storm. The usual procedure, after a bill has been read the third time and is under discussion is to let it go to a vote and be voted down.

House bill 324, by Mr. Ford and Senator Hall makes a correction in the bond law of 1921 that permits the highway commission to issue road bonds up to the legal limit, making about two and a half millions more money available. This may help in the Roosevelt highway program.

M. J. Lee, former member from Clackamas county and afterwards in the sawmill business at Cottage Grove, was a visitor here yesterday. The fact that he isn't a member probably accounts for some of the lack of oratory and much more for lack of a number of good

laughs. He didn't get many bills over but he did get a goodly number of other things over.

The public hearing last night by the committee investigating prohibition enforcement was as much of a farce as most public hearings are. "Tilly of Tillamook" was given an opportunity to add another chapter to her somewhat famous booklet that intimately portrays alleged misdeeds of public officials and bootleggers and alleged immorality of young and old in the metropolis and Oz West was given an opportunity to compliment law enforcement during his regime as governor. With the minds of the members of the special committee made up, the public hearing could be little else than an opportunity for pent-up oratory to spill itself. Cleaver must go. That is the sentiment. And prohibition enforcement can not be successful so long as W. J. Herwig, of the anti-saloon league is permitted to be one of the big toads in the puddle.
