

HEARING ON BOUNDARY UP IN EUGENE TOMORROW

Proposal to Enlarge School District Coming Before County Officials.

Remonstrance Expected From Latham Residents Over Suggested Change.

A hearing on the proposed extension of the Cottage Grove school district to take in a strip of land approximately one-half mile square including the Anderson & Middleton mill A at Latham and a number of residences which, it is thought, would be more conveniently served by the Cottage Grove district, will be held at the Lane county court house in Eugene Friday, February 27.

The proposal to take in this territory in the Cottage Grove school district comes as a result of the crowded condition of the school and the expressed desire on the part of a number of residents of that section to send their children to Cottage Grove to school.

At the present time the allotment for each pupil taken in from outside the district in the form of tuition amounts to \$27. The schools in the city are now crowded to capacity and it is difficult to take care of any more.

With the bringing of the Anderson & Middleton mill at Latham into the district, however, it is estimated that the increase in the taxable property would be sufficient to offset the crowded condition of the schools and provide relief in the near future.

The 23 mill school tax now in the Cottage Grove district is the highest in this part of the state. About a year ago the county accepted the new county law which provides for a larger amount of money for the country districts giving them an allotment of \$60 for the first ten students and \$50 for the next twenty with \$30 for all others.

Because of the crowded condition of the schools it may be necessary to refuse admission to students outside the district or to raise the tuition rates so high as to be prohibitive.

If one student in the county is admitted outside the district all who desire to enter must be

"Evergreen Land" Is Name for Northwest Products

The judges in the trade mark contest recently carried on by the Portland chamber of commerce decided upon Evergreen Land as first choice, which wins the \$50 prize, and the word Mello-clime as second choice which wins the \$25 prize.

Fully twenty-five people submitted the word Evergreen alone and also in different forms, but only one submitted the name Evergreen Land, Bertha M. Shahan, 961 North street, Portland. Mello-clime was submitted by William O. Krause, 531 Alberta street, Portland.

An investigation will now be made to ascertain whether either of these words can be used and whether acceptable to the trade. The decision was unanimous on the part of the judges in each case. He judges worked very hard on this decision and gave several hours of their time freely.

Other names suggested which received special consideration by the judges and which may be preferred by the producers were: Best of West, U-Lik-Um and Ore-gold, and it is possible some of these may be used as the Over-riding Brand, instead of those selected for the prizes if it is found they are already in use and cannot be made use of by the North Pacific territory.

Another Showing For Game Pictures Is Planned

Because the pictures of the game and fish shown at the Arende Theatre Tuesday evening failed to arrive in time for the afternoon performance, which was planned for the school children of the city, there will be another showing of the game and fish commission films in the near future at which time there will also be a special matinee for the school children.

SUPPORT OF CITY BAND URGED BY LOCAL INTERESTS

Possibility of Frequent Concerts in City Park Under New Plan Is Pointed Out.

The united support of all organizations and citizens in Cottage Grove for the city band is urged by a movement now under way among the various clubs and business interests.

One thing which has brought out the value of the band to the city and which has pointed to new uses for it is the change in the management of the city park now under way. With the park as a playground rather than an auto camp the possibility of frequent band concerts is looked forward to as a possibility.

Whether it will be possible to do this within the next year has not been determined but it is considered likely that the initial steps which will lead to the erection of a new stand for concert use will be taken in the near future.

The value of a band to the city has been pointed out repeatedly by persons who are interested in the success of the musicians. Last fourth of July a band was brought from Eugene at an expense of \$250 for the celebration held here.

Local musicians are making every effort to make a success of the work they are undertaking. Many of them are located at Culp Creek and Rojads and find it difficult to return to the city for the weekly practice each Monday evening.

Pillars Near Highway To Be Erected By Club

Log pillars will be constructed by the Lion's club to mark the north and south entrance to the city along the Pacific highway and welcome signs displayed from them for the incoming motorists according to plans of that organization now under way.

It is the opinion of the club that logs will be more appropriate than a concrete pillar, such as is constructed by many cities, would be because of the extensive lumbering of the vicinity.

The exact form which the pillars will take will be determined later. There will be one on each side of the road at both the north and south entrances to the city.

Signs welcoming those coming in and giving some kind of greeting to those leaving the city will also be a part of the structure.

PAVING ORDINANCES COMING BEFORE COUNCIL MONDAY

Final Action on Lateral Sewers Also Expected; Paving Work May Start in April.

Ordinances for the paving of south Sixth street, east Washington street and Chestnut avenue will be presented at the meeting of the city council Monday evening.

If these ordinances are adopted by the council it will take remonstrances, representing two-thirds of the property affected by the proposed improvement and presented to the council following notices of the intention to pave, which will be sent out by the city recorder, to prevent the work.
