ago the publication of the notices was delayed until action was taken by the council on the other proposed paving. The city charter provides that the advertising for bids for the work must follow within ten days after the publication of the notices to property owners.

Ordinances are also being drawn for the establishment of three lateral sewer districts in the city. The boundaries of these districts are being determined by the city engineer working with the sewer committee.

Another ordinance which will come up at Monday's meeting is the one providing for the establishing of a fee of \$15 for connection with the main trunk line sewer where no lateral district has been established.

At the last meeting the matter of giving Godard & Randall the right to build a railroad spur on north Lane street was taken up and an ordinance ordered drawn for this purpose.

but two years ago he said he... at this year favor an appropriation for Cottage Grove. There will be no chance to override a veto on the bills, for the members are going home at "noon" tomorrow by the legislative clock.

The Astoria armory appropriation bill tumbled out on the house floor, but was bowled over and temporarily buried. An attempt later to bring it to life was unsuccessful. The fate of this bill was due to the fact that the state already had made an appropriation to Astoria in a remission of taxes while the city recovers from the damage of the great fire of two years ago.

This so-called last-minute raid upon the treasury has been condemned by the "no" voters, but a certain amount of pork has to be dispensed and there are many friends of the armories. The federal government continuously spends five dollars for every dollar the state puts into armories.

taken in. The exclusion, however, would not prevent students from Douglas county, a number of whom are attending here, from continuing in school. Douglas county pays about the actual cost per pupil. And one teacher is provided from the fund.

Considerable opposition to the annexation of this section is expected from various Latham residents and it is likely that remonstrance will be filed with the boundary board against the transfer of the property to the Cottage Grove district. It is said that the large amount of taxable property and the number of students which the change would take from the Latham district would prove a serious injury to the school there.
