Some Reasons Why I Believe There Is Commercial Oil In Lane County

GUSHERS ON ALL SIDES

FIRST: Because there are gushers south in California, north in Canada, east in Montana, Wyoming and Colorado and west oil is gushing out in the Pacific Ocean and no scientific reason can be given why the Creator should have forgotten the center between all of these districts.

IN BETWEEN PROPER ENCLOSURES

SECOND: Lane County is located between the Cascade mountains and the Coast range and between natural dikes that follow the general trend of these mountains, making perfect enclosures as reservoirs for oil.

THE NECESSARY UPLIFTS ARE HERE

THIRD: In between these mountain ranges and dikes there are well defined anticlines in perfect contact with synclines and monoclines, with the uplift up against these dikes, fault lines, traps and enclosures showing that the earth has been heaved up by internal pressure caused by gas, resulting from oil.

SUFFICIENT FOSSIL BEDS

FOURTH: In between the basis of the anticlines and monoclines perfectly constructed oil domes are clearly visible, with large clam beds and fossil beds to be found on the top of these domes, which once was the tide water of the salt water sea; which now has been lifted hundreds of feet higher than where the shore line of the ocean with its tides ebbing in and out containing these clam beds one was.

THE LOGS OF WELLS TELL THEIR STORIES

FIFTH: From the logs of the wells drilled in Lane County down to a depth of between two and three thousand feet, marine, eocene and oligocene and other sea fossils including also vegetable beds have been encountered, which shows that the oligocene sea microscopic life, also organic and vegetable life has ages and ages been covered thousands of feet below our present surface in large enough quantities into the salt water preservation to form large bodies and oil pools sufficient to give this area an oil field of surprising magnitude.

SHELLS AND SHALE BEDS FOUND DEEP IN THE EARTH

SIXTH: The shell and shale beds and the great variety of oil formations already encountered in the wells now being drilled in Lane County gives the strongest evidence that this field contains most favorable oil formations which in other fields are producing oil in large quantities.

SEVENTH: The indicative oil sands containing black and white paraffin and beautiful rainbow colors of high grade paraffin base oil showings of a sufficient quantity to satisfy any oil expert that we are on oil structures capable of producing oil in commercial quantities.

LARGE WELLS POSSIBLE

EIGHTH: In both the wells now being drilled sufficient gas has already been encountered to show that there will be enough pressure back of the oil reservoir to justify the belief on the part of Scientists that this field is capable of producing gushers.

OIL SEEPAGE

NINTH: The oil seepages that are found in hundreds of places all over the country with sulphur and gas coming to the surface, also show that this country is under a strong gas pressure forcing these showings even to the very surface, in water wells, springs and in swampy places.

GENERAL TOPOGRAPHY RIGHT

TENTH: The writer has visited and carefully examined practically all of the great oil fields of the United States, Mexico and Canada and must honestly say that the general topographical lay of the land, oil structures, anticlines, synclines, monoclines, oil domes, fossil beds, dikes, traps, enclosures, inlets, apices of anticlines, with their axis, with the necessary drainage on era, and fault lines, forming reservoirs as found in Lane County constitutes the nearest duplication of these great oil fields of anything that the undersigned has heretofore found in any field.

RICH GAS AND OIL IN COAL BEDS

ELEVENTH: Lane County contains many coal beds which coal contains so much petroleum gas that even ten ounces of said coal put in a retort will produce enough gas to burn at an average candle

power strength of 20 candle power for a period of two hours and ten minutes, and in addition to this gives forth a surprising quantity of oil and oil tar and red ammonia water and other valuable minerals too numerous to mention. This would indicate the presence of oil and gas which has not been effected by any volcanic eruption, all of which goes to prove that the oil and gas is still here in its original strength and quality.

GREAT GEOLOGISTS TESTIFY

TWELFTH: The eleven reasons above briefly mentioned may help to explain why Robert F. Campbell, geologist, graduate in geology, mineralogy and paleontology, of Edinburgh University, Scotland, and several American schools of geology, said in his report of September 1st, 1923, "The leases which you have accepted to drill cover acreage that has been passed and defined as oil structures by the best authority in the world."

Dr. Horschel C. Parker, a scientist and geologist strongly endorsed in the last edition of "Who Is Who," in his report made July 29th, 1924, goes on record and says, "I feel absolutely certain, in fact I know that this is an oil field. I am sure that both the well on the hill at Eugene and the one at Cottage Grove will be producers. I would not be surprised to see either one of them come in as gushers any minute."

In a report made in the "Oregon Daily Emerald," published by the State University of Oregon in its issue of May 8th, 1923, "Definite correlation of the Eugene sandstone with the oligocene formations of Astoria has been brought about through the discovery of an asturina agustata, a form of sea life related to the pearly nautilus, in a railroad cut just east of Eugene."

Honorable Mr. Lieberg, an authority in geology, said, "Eugene is underlain with a vast deposit of oil."

Mr. Howard Hurlbert, an expert oil man and oil locator, in a report given out June 23d, 1923, positively states that the two wells now being drilled in Lane County will come in with more than a thousand barrels of oil a day.

The Penn Pacific Oil Company with many eminent geologists in a recent report positively states, "No oil field could be predicted with greater certainty until actually producing wells have been brought in. The extent of the field also places it as probably one of the very greatest in the whole country." In this same report they even mentioned the wells now being drilled in Lane County as well located for oil.

Geologist J. B. Young, who recently visited the Lane County wells, unhesitatingly declared that the wells were located on geological structures and that the showings of gas oil gave every evidence of large producers when the proper geological depths have been reached.

Honorable Mr. Yakley, geologist for the Standard Oil Company, has reported that the possibilities for oil in and near Eugene in the Willamette Valley are very good.

Honorable Mr. Kellogg, geologist from California, examined the showings at the wells and positively stated that what he saw constituted an unfailing sign of large producers.

In the Eugene Daily Guard of May 11th, 1923, the following statement was contained, "Six months ago there were but three or four oil operators in Oregon but to date there are thirty operations under way. According to statements made by Geologists who have examined the territory there are indications that there is a great deposit of oil which it is expected will be tapped by the wells now being drilled. These companies have all been encouraged by the very best geologists that could be obtained." This ought to indicate to any honest reader what real geologists have already had to say and what they are willing to do and stake their reputations on in so saying and doing.

Many other Geologists, too numerous to mention, have made similar reports and many more have reported favorably on the state as a whole, including Honorable Dorsey Hager and including a map and statement from the United States Geological Survey at Washington, D. C., which the writer has in his possession for proof if necessary. A digest from this report reads, "Oregon is a wonderful state with untold wealth lying underneath the surface in petroleum and mineral deposits."

In the Sutherland Sun of April 13th, 1923, the following article appeared from the pen of D. E. Livingstone, professor of geology at the Oregon Agricultural College, "Oil may be discovered at any time in Oregon."

Mr. Clement L. Webster, M. S., Geologist, Mineralogist and Paleontologist, who is endorsed by the "Smithsonian Institution" and "American Men of Science" with titles and endorsements too numerous to mention, on the 30th day of December, 1924, made a lengthy report which appeared in the "Eugene Daily Guard" and the "Eugene Morning Register," in which he positively declared as follows: "In all my many years of travel and experience in geology and in oil field investigations no where have I seen finer or more numerous typical geological oil structures, including domes, anticlines, synclines, monoclines, closures, confining beds, etc., than are found in the Eugene quadrangle. The oil wells at Eugene are being drilled on the apex of splendid oil domes. Comparatively few such perfect oil domes exist in other oil fields."

J. E. Barry, geologist and graduate in geology under Honorable Dorsey Hager, one of the world's greatest geologists, on the 24th day of December, 1924, made an extensive report including contour maps of the Eugene quadrangle, in which he shows the Eugene well is located on the axis of the apex, between the basis of anticline on an oil dome and positively predicts an oil well of large production and the opening of an oil field of large proportions when the wells now being drilled have reached their geological depths.

WORLD CONTOUR MAP SHOWS OIL FIELD

In adjusting the affairs between nations from war to peace conditions, the oil concessions of the world also played its important part. In this connection a contour map of the oil regions of the world was scientifically prepared and published, which map was copyrighted by Funk & Wagnalls Company, New York City, which may be made on a scale of 2000 miles to the inch; which map shows the location of the great oil pools of the world; which map shows two large oil pools near the western coast of Oregon of over one hundred miles of length and breadth, given to each oil pool. All of this clearly shows that the great geologists who prepared this map knew that there were large oil pools in western Oregon.

OIL MAP REVEALS GREAT OIL POOL

In the Geological Book of Oil Geology known as "Popular Oil Geology," from the Colorado Geological Department and Bureau of Mines, by the great Geologist, Victor Ziegler, printed in 1920, the oil pools of America are clearly set forth. This pictures the oil pools and in so doing reveals an oil pool in Western Oregon which runs the whole length of the entire state, over 75 miles wide and pictures a solid pool of oil including all the land now being drilled by the Guaranty Oil Company of Oregon, which again shows that the great Geologists and Geological authorities know that there were large oil pools in and near Eugene and Cottage Grove, long before the Guaranty Oil Company began its operations in Lane County. All of this reveals that mysterious motives of some kind or another has held back operations in this field. All of this also reveals something of the reasons for the opposition to the Guaranty Oil Company operations at this time. In the minds of many these revelations are interpreted to mean that those who knew about these oil pools were not ready at this time to have an oil field opened in Lane County. This also reveals that there is strong geological evidence of oil pools with commercial oil in Lane County.

What these geologists of great note have so positively stated over their signatures, after most careful examination of the state in general and of Lane County in particular, constitutes my twelfth reason for believing that there is commercial oil in Lane County. I therefore, will leave it to your good judgment which to believe, scientific and geological research based on facts as set forth by those who are in a position to know, or negative opinions which will not stand the test of investigation.

In this brief survey I have not attempted to exhaust the subject or to give all that can be said on any point but have tried to give a few facts in the briefest possible form, or at least twelve geological and scientific reasons why I honestly believe that there is commercial oil in Lane County.

In conclusion I here submit over my signature that which I sincerely believe future history will more than verify.
