Fred Ernst Dies. Fred Ernst died Saturday morning following a stroke of paralysis. He had suffered two similar strokes some time before. McKenzie Highway Changes. Change in the McKenzie highway on both sides of Blue river will be made this year, according to members of the county court who were in that locality recently. Plans were laid to obtain the right-of-way for the changes but no agreement was reached with the property owners.

Divorce Figures Are Given. Statistics on divorce decrees granted in Lane county during 1924 have been prepared at the office of County Clerk Bryson for the government census bureau. The report also reveals that the percentage of divorce increases in inverse ratio to the number of children.

Of the 116 couples divorced, 63 had no minor children, 28 had one child, 14 two children, five had three children, three couples had four children and one couple had six minor children.
