**CLEAN WRESTLING DEMANDED.**

Nearly every man has enough  
sporting blood, enough admiration  
for a demonstration of physical  
power and endurance so that he  
enjoys a good wrestling match, or  
even a clean boxing match. Many  
women also come in the same  
category. Cottage Grove, by its  
attendance at the wrestling matches  
that have been put on here, has  
demonstrated its approval of sport-  
ing events of this character.

But Cottage Grove wants clean  
wrestling matches. It demonstrated  
this by its vociferated disapproval  
of the brand of punishment in-  
flicted by Billy Edwards in his  
most recent match with Ralph  
Hand. His game is a knuckle  
game. When the knuckles are  
used in a headlock, it is not a

question of endurance by the other  
fellow, it is not a question of the  
ability of the other to absorb  
punishment. That kind of punish-  
ment robs the antagonist of his  
senses and any hold that takes  
away the ability of one of the  
contestants to use his ingenuity in  
getting away is not clean sport.  
It is not sport at all, it is plain  
brutality.

That seems to be the only game  
that Edwards knows, for which  
reason, in our humble opinion, he  
is not really a wrestler at all.  
He will not appear here again.  
That is certain. Few would go to  
see him wrestle and even the use  
of a building has already been  
denied him.

We are rid of Edwards, but let  
the demonstration against Edwards  
be a warning to any others who  
come here. Cottage Grove will  
support clean sport of any kind,  
but dirty sport, which is really not  
sport at all, is taboo.

Incidentally Cottage Grove fans,  
despite their disapproval of the  
Edwards method of pinning his  
man to the mat, are tickled pink  
over the fact that the popular  
Mike Yokel, the old Roman, put  
Edwards out at his own game in  
a recent match in Portland.

Hurrah for clean sport! Down  
with dirty sport! That is the way  
Cottage Grove stands.

**"WHITEAKER," OR "WHITTA-  
KER," OR WHAT?**

(Portland Oregonian.)  
In the very beginning of its  
existence as a sovereign state Oregon  
had as governor John Whiteaker.  
Mark the spelling carefully, for

somewhat later, when Portland  
grew in a southerly direction and  
streets were laid out and named for  
pioneer governors, an obviously sin-  
cere effort was made to do honor  
to the Whiteaker name. Passing  
street cars, too, emblazon the name  
of the dauntless gentleman who held  
nearly as many offices as there  
were years of his residence in Ore-  
gon, and whose fellow citizens de-  
lighted to honor him while he lived.

Yet the student of Oregon his-  
tory, who is concerned with getting  
things straight, is disturbed now  
and then. For on street signs,  
street cars and elsewhere, and in  
the city directory, the telephone  
book and other sources of presumed  
authority, are inscribed variously  
"Whitaker" and "Whittaker," but  
nowhere to the best of our knowl-  
edge doth "Whiteaker" appear.  
That this is not as it ought to be  
will, we believe, be generally  
conceded. It violates our sense of  
the proprieties, of the etiquette  
that ought to govern, if it does  
not, the bestowal of signal honors  
on distinguished men. It is sloppy,  
if not actually cavalier. It leads  
one to doubt whether we really  
know our first state governor or  
not. It is an evil example of in-  
accuracy as to a prime fact in  
history to set before our boys and  
girls.

It is worth looking into. As-  
suming that the error arose in  
some antiquated city ordinance,  
it is not impossible to repair. We  
are mindful of the similar instance  
in which a neighboring county in  
the state of Washington was sought  
to be named for the great explorer,  
William Clark, but has the name  
"Clarke" instead. What Clarke?  
There were Clarks and Clarks,  
though there may not have been  
Whitakers, Whittakers and White-  
akers, but only a Whiteaker. The  
Oregonian contended long and more  
or less valiantly for Clark and  
none other, to be thrown back on  
the incontestable fact that the  
name the Washington legislature  
bestowed was "Clarke," whereas  
every schoolboy knows that com-  
panion of Meriwether Lewis was  
Clark, an obfuscation of history  
that has damaging implications.

So it is with Governor Whiteaker,  
whose memory is sorely affronted  
by this gross neglect.

The Oregonian should take con-  
solation from the fact that Cottage  
Grove has named a street after  
Governor Whiteaker and that the  
name is correctly spelled on the  
street signs. There are many, how-  
ever, who neglect to correctly pro-  
nounce it.

owners have already paid their tax-  
es. Last week the average daily  
return was about \$6000 but this  
will show a big increase between  
now and April 5, the final date  
for payment of the first half.

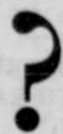
