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**ED IS COMING HOME.**

Ed Brodie is coming back from Siam, where they never have to sing, "How Dry I Am." After some three years in the diplomatic service, he will return to his Oregon City newspaper. It may get hot once in awhile around the editorial sanctum, but never so unbearably warm as in the Siamese empire, where the king can have as many wives as he wishes and therefore have it as warm as he wishes. Of course Ed will have to go back to work. That might discourage some, but not Ed. He likes to work. The lack of work in the diplomatic service may be one of the reasons he is coming back.

Before Ed went away he took a trip over the state with the editor of The Sentinel and the two saw most of the mountains and chasms, plains and hills, forests and streams of the old state. Ed was as enraptured as a little kid—nearly as much so as the editor of The Sentinel—and we knew then that he could not for long be happy elsewhere.

**ELECTION CHANGES NEEDED.**

The Eugene Register has given expression to another sensible idea. The fact that our legislative sessions are held in the odd years leaves nearly two years between a legislative session and the next general election. That fact makes it necessary to call a special election to vote upon measures referred to the people by the legislative session, or referred by the people themselves after enactment by the legislative session. If this is not done, such legislative enactments are not acted upon for nearly two years. Were the legislative ses-

sions held in the even years, the general election would come in the November following. Measures referred by the legislative session could even be acted upon at the May primaries following three months after the legislative session. If such a change is made—and it should be—it would be well to at the same time move the primary election up to within 20 or 30 days of the general election. Six months between the two elections is altogether too much. With one closely following the other, there would be more interest in both.
