New Star Coach Now At Lane Auto Co.

The new Star coach, universally acclaimed one of the most beautiful light cars that has ever been offered to buyers in the low-priced automobile class, has arrived in Cottage Grove and is on display at the salesroom of the Lane Auto company, local Star dealers. It is the first showing of the new Star coach here.

This car, one of the hits of the recent automobile shows held throughout the country, fills a definite need in the low-priced transportation field.

Artistically designed, yet carrying out every utilitarian idea yet advanced to automobile buyers, as well as an unusual completeness of equipment, the new coach has met with an instantaneous demand. A rushed factory production has been unable to supply a growing demand for the new coach.

It is built on the same sturdy and rugged chassis upon which the great popularity of the Star car models has been built, with the standard equipment of the "MILLION DOLLAR MOTOR," four wheels brakes, and is equipped with disc wheels and balloon tires as standard, so that its performance record will be fully in keeping with the records hung up by other well known models of the 1925 Star line.

Finished in deep blue color, the whole body is circled at the top with a double white ivory stripe. The front seating arrangement is unique in coach construction and, as the right front door is opened, it becomes apparent that great pains have been taken to provide the widest possible entrance to the rear seat. The front seat, instead of folding up forwards, is so hinged that it folds away from the door, as well, leaving no obstacles whatever to the rear seat aisle. This is accomplished by folding the back seat down, then folding the seat over towards the driver's seat.

Exceptional space is noted throughout the Star coach interior, it being possible to sit comfortably and without "cramping" in the rear seats when the front seats are in position. The cushions are deep and wide, making for still greater comfort. Over the upholstery and lining the interior is a beautiful basket weave coach cloth.

The coach comes with a long list of accessories as standard equipment, including heavily nicked winged radiator cap, as well as nicked radiator shell; automatic windshield wiper; "one turn" windows; three ventilators, two above the one-piece windshield and one in the cowl; centered dome light; kick plates on the running board; inside door lock on driver's side, locked by pulling up on the door lever and unlocked by pushing down on it; outside door lock on right door.

The coach has a leather top and the rear quarter is artfully graced by louaudeit type bows. The balloon tire size is 29x4.95 inches, standard coach equipment. The coach created a sensation at the San Francisco automobile show, where sales for it were limited only by the number of deliveries it was possible to make. Deliveries did not start until some time after the show had been concluded and, wherever it has appeared, the coach has been responsible for increasing Star sales.

According to the Lane Auto company, local Star dealers, who have the car on display here for the first time, a limited number of orders can be filled on the coach. n20c
