The polls will be open for the purpose of said Special Election between the hours of 9 o'clock in the forenoon and 12 o'clock noon and between the hours of 1 o'clock in the afternoon and 5 o'clock in the afternoon of said day. The armory, lower floor A. F. & A. M. Building, corner "H" and Main, in the First Ward; Council Chamber of the City Hall, Sixth street between Main and Washington, in the second Ward; and Mrs. Nettie Kibben's residence, corner Tenth and Jefferson, in the Third Ward are designated as polling places.

Mrs. Frances Nichols is hereby designated as judge and Mrs. Anna Swanson and Mrs. Margaret Lebow as judges and clerks of said election in the First Ward.

Mrs. Blanche Short is hereby designated as judge and Mrs. Nellie Piteher and Mrs. Linnie Sterling as judges and clerks of said election in the second Ward.

The following are the Charter Amendments to be voted on:

CHARTER AMENDMENT.

An Act to amend the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove, Lane County, Oregon, by adding a new chapter thereto authorizing and empowering the Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City to the amount of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose of building and constructing a reserve reservoir and for the replacement, maintenance and improvement of the water system of the said City of Cottage Grove.

The City of Cottage Grove does ordain as follows:

"Be it enacted by the Electors of the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon:

"Section 1: That the Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City to the amount of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose of building and constructing a reserve reservoir and for the replacement, maintenance and improvement of the water system of the said City of Cottage Grove.

"Section 2: The bonds hereby authorized shall be denominated 'Water System Improvement Bonds'; they shall be a general obligation of the City of Cottage Grove, Lane County, Oregon, in denominations of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) each, due twenty years from date; said bonds to bear interest at not to exceed five (5) per cent per annum from date thereof, payable semi-annually at the City Treasurer's office in Cottage Grove, Lane County, Oregon, and the City reserves the right to retire any or all of said bonds after ten (10) years from date thereof.

"Section 3: The Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove is hereby authorized and directed to include in its general municipal tax levy each year sufficient special levy to pay the interest on the bonds and to provide for the payment of the principal thereof when due, if same cannot be paid from water revenue.

"Section 4: The Common Council of the City is hereby authorized to issue and sell said bonds from time to time as they may be needed for the purpose herein specified, but before any of them shall be sold they shall be advertised for sale by the publication of a notice asking for bids therefor to be published in a newspaper in Cottage Grove, Oregon, twice a week for two successive and consecutive weeks prior to the time of the sale, and they may also give notice of the sale of said bonds in such other papers as they may deem to be best for the interest of the City in effecting a sale, but if no satisfactory bids be received they may sell them at private sale at not less than par and accrued interest.

"Section 5: The indebtedness authorized by this Amendment to the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove is in addition to all other indebtedness authorized and incurred by the City of Cottage Grove, and shall not be considered as effected by any limitation of the indebtedness in the Charter of the City or elsewhere."

"Section 4: The Common Council of the City is hereby authorized to issue and sell said bonds from time to time as they may be needed for the purpose herein specified, but before any of them shall be sold they shall be advertised for sale by the publication of a notice asking for bids therefor to be published in a newspaper in Cottage Grove, Oregon, twice a week for three (3) successive and consecutive weeks prior to the time of the sale, and they may also give notice of the sale of said bonds in such other papers as they may deem to be best for the interest of the City in effecting a sale, but if no satisfactory bids be received they may sell them at private sale, but no sale either public or private sale shall be made for less than the face value of said bonds and accrued interest.

"Section 5: Said bonds shall not be taken or considered as a part of the bonded indebtedness limitation provided in Section 1, of Chapter XI or other section or chapter of the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon, but are hereby specially authorized by a vote of the people of the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon.

"Section 6: The funds arising from the sale or disposal of all bonds provided for in this Act shall be known as 'Water System Improvement Bond,' and shall be kept separate and apart from all other funds of the City of Cottage Grove, and shall only be used to pay the Costs and Expenses that may be incurred by the City of Cottage Grove in the constructing and building a reserve reservoir, and for the replacement, maintenance and improvement of the water system of the said City of Cottage Grove, Oregon."

CHARTER AMENDMENT.

An Act to amend the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove, Lane County, Oregon, by adding a new chapter thereto authorizing and empowering the Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City to the amount of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose of paving street intersections of the City.

The City of Cottage Grove does ordain as follows:

Be it enacted by the Electors of the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon:

"Section 1: That the Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City to the amount of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose of paving street intersections of the City.

"Section 2: That the bonds hereby authorized shall be denominated, 'Paving Intersection Bonds.' They shall be a general obligation of the City of Cottage Grove, and shall be in such form and of such denomination as they shall be in the judgment of the Common Council, he most likely to conduce to their salability. They shall be made due and payable ten years from date of their issuance and bear interest at a rate not to exceed five (5) per cent per annum, payable annually.

"Section 3: The Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove is hereby authorized to include in its general tax levy, sufficient special levy to pay the interest on the bonds and provide a sinking fund for the payment of the amounts due.

"Section 4: The Common Council of the City is hereby authorized to issue and sell said bonds from time to time as they may be necessary for the purpose herein specified, but before any of the bonds shall be sold they shall be advertised for sale, by publication of a notice asking for bids therefor, to be published in a newspaper in Cottage Grove, Oregon, twice a week for two successive and consecutive weeks prior to the time of the sale, and they may also give notice of the sale of said bonds in such other papers as they may deem to be best for the interest of the City in effecting a sale, but if no satisfactory bids be received they may sell them at private sale at not less than par and accrued interest.

"Section 5: The indebtedness authorized by this Amendment to the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove is in addition to all other indebtedness authorized and incurred by the City of Cottage Grove, and shall not be considered as effected by any limitation of the indebtedness in the Charter of the City or elsewhere."
