**KITCHEN CUPBOARD**

**From Grandmother's Book**

IS THERE anyone who does not enjoy a nicely made, well-seasoned and baked pumpkin pie? Old-Fashioned Pumpkin Pie.—Take one and one-half cupsful of well-stewed and browned pumpkin which has been sifted to remove all stringy portions, two-thirds of a cupful of brown sugar or the same of white, with two tablespoonfuls of molasses, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful of ginger, one teaspoonful of salt, a quarter of a teaspoonful of lemon extract, two slightly beaten eggs and a pint of rich milk. Combine the ingredients and turn into rich pastry-lined pie plate and bake in a moderate oven until when a knife is thrust into the center it comes out clean. If desired for an especially festive occasion, sprinkle with nuts or grated cheese and top with roses of whipped cream.

Golden Chips.—Slice pumpkin into strips one-half inch thick, take an equal weight of sugar, adding one-half cupful of lemon juice for each two pounds of sugar. Place the pumpkin and sugar in the preserving kettle in alternate layers. Pour the lemon juice over the whole and let stand twenty-four hours. Add one cupful of water for each three pounds of sugar and an ounce each of ginger root and lemon peel for each pound of fruit. Cook until the slices are tender, pack in an earthen jar, boil down the sirup until thick and pour over the fruit boiling hot. Seal.

Squash makes a pie that is enjoyed by many, almost as well as pumpkin. Prepare it in the same manner. Cooked mashed carrots also makes a most wholesome pie filling.

Steamed Squash, Baked.—Cut Hubbard squash into small pieces, steam until tender. Mash and mix with butter and thick cream to season, add one beaten egg, salt and white pepper. Mix thoroughly and put into a well-buttered baking dish, cover with a thick layer of well-buttered crumbs and bake forty minutes in a slow oven.

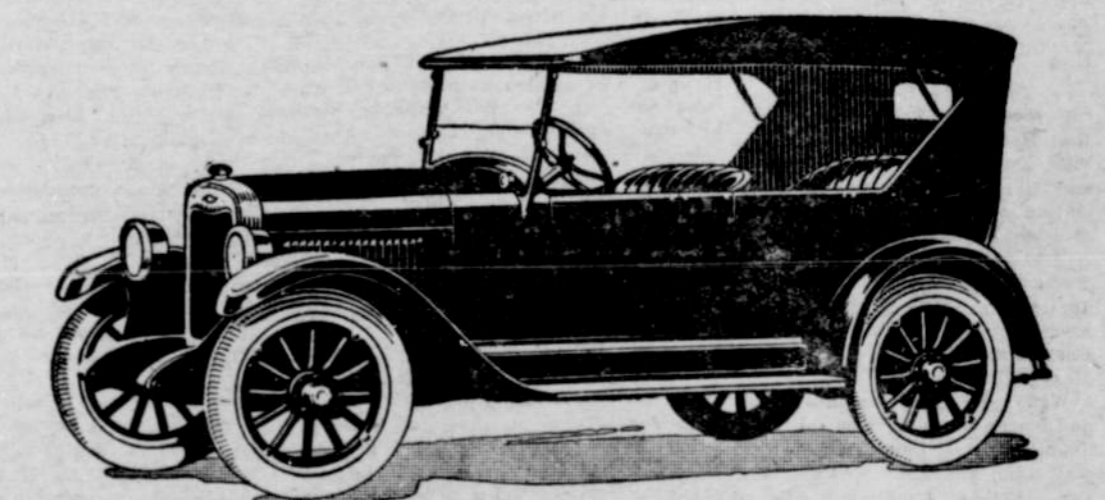
