Postage Rates High 40 Years Ago

Mail service 60 years ago was not what it is today. This is illustrated by a clipping which J. L. Beatty has found in a scrap book which was kept by Israel B. Van Sant, a brother of Mr. Beatty's mother.

On single letters, carried any distance not exceeding 30 miles, 6 cents; over 30, and not exceeding 80, 10 cents; over 80, and not over 150, 12 1/2 cents; over 150, and not over 400, 18 1/2 cents; over 400, 25 cents.

It is evident from a reading of those rates that in those days the letter paper, after being written upon, was folded to form an envelope, the letter and the envelope being one piece of paper.

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received for the sale of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, of "Water System Improvement Bonds" by the City Recorder of said City at his office in the City of Cottage Grove until the hour of eight o'clock P. M. on Wednesday the 10th day of June, 1925, at which time and in the Council Chamber of the City Hall of Cottage Grove, said bids will be opened and considered by the Common Council of said City; said Bonds shall bear date the first day of June, 1925, and will be due as to principal and payable by the City of Cottage Grove as follows:

Principal due twenty (20) years from date; said bonds to be issued in denominations of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) with interest bearing coupons attached, bearing interest at not to exceed five (5) per cent per annum from date of issuance; and the said interest to be paid semi-annually on the first day of June each year after the date of issuance. The City reserves the right to retire any or all of said Bonds after ten (10) years from date thereof; and the principal and interest shall be payable at the City Treasurer's office in Cottage Grove, Oregon.
