Longer School Week.  
(Corvallis Gazette-Times.)  
The Oregon university has decided to have classes six days a week. Some sense to that. It is utter foolishness to have the immense overhead of public buildings lying idle 28 per cent of the time during the school year and practically 100 per cent the other three months. The same thing is true of the public schools. There is no good reason why they should not run six days in the week and the year around. Our nine month idea originated from the fact that in the beginning of public schools they were run so as not to interfere with farm work. Gradually the school term grew till it encroached on everything but the summer months when in most countries it is too hot for study. That it not true here, however, and the school cost could be cut down if school was a continuous session with a week's vacation occasionally. It would be fairer to teachers too. They get a wholly inadequate salary considering the preparation they must have. The sum of \$125 or \$150 a month looks fairly good until it is remembered that there are three months with no income and increased outgo. If a teacher could teach 12 months in a year, she would have some chance.
